A Message From The President



This year marks the 66th annual Garrett County Agriculture Fair. While much has changed in Garrett County since the 1st fair was held on these same grounds in 1957 there are still a few things that have stayed consistent. Another page in the Fair Book is dedicated to explaining the early history of the Fair but there are some things I think are important to highlight as we hit another milestone year for the Garrett County Fair.

Agriculture Focus - Agriculture continues to be the primary focus of the Fair. We continue to see each of our barns filled with kids and their animals and consistently hear from our judges that the level of competition in our Show Ring is second to none. It's great to continue to see the high number of exhibits and exhibitors related to the ag industry.

It's all about the kids - Well maybe the big kids too... The Fair is meant to be a family friendly event with entertainment for kids of all ages. We continue to partner with Reithoffer Amusements for our carnival and hope you will take the time to check out their rides and games as well as all of our track events.

Location - Our Fair has been located on the same property for the past 66 years. In the early years Charles (Skeeter) Bowman leased the grounds to the Fair Board for the week of the Fair. In time he sold the Fair Board the parcel where the buildings are located and eventually the remaining ground was purchased from Mr. Bowman for the rest of the parking area. One of the gounset huts has been in use for the full 66 years.

All Volunteer - Our Fair is managed and operated by a volunteer Board of Directors and volunteer Superintendents. There are no full time or part time employees of the Fair. The volunteers spend countless hours all year long preparing their areas of the Fair for another successful year.

Community Support - Providing support to other non-profit organizations has always been an important part of the Fair's mission. While the Fair is managed by unpaid volunteers we do also regularly contract with other non-profit organizations to provide critical services like our entry gates, cleaning the grounds and managing some of our track events.

Local food vendors - The Fair is approached regularly by commercial food vendors that would like to set up at the Fair and sell their foods. The Fair Board consistently turns away these commercial vendors so that our local non-profits can continue their own fundraising efforts and provide the food we all look forward to during Fair week. We recognize that the week of the Fair represents the largest fund raiser for most of these groups and we want to help them realize their goals as well.

On behalf of the Board we welcome you to the 66th annual Garrett County Agriculture Fair, we thank you for attending and hope you enjoy your week at the Fair.

Garrett County Agriculture Fair Early History

The very first Garrett County Fair was held in 1917 in the Naylor Building on Third Street in Oakland, and the lot between that building and Center Street. Later, sheds were constructed Center Street on the Sweeney lot to house part of the exhibits, and successful fairs were held at this location until the early twenties. As interest in the Fair increased, it became necessary to have more space, so the Bradley property west of Oakland was purchased. Some of the exhibits were housed in the Bradley house. A shed was erected for the livestock and poultry entries. The last of the fairs held at the Bradley farm location was in 1931.

Most of the earlier Garrett County fairs were held in late September, because more farm products were available for showing at that time of the year. However, many people who had experience with these fairs said that attendance and general support were in direct relation to the weather, and the weather here in late September is often less than ideal for going to the fair. Several years of bad weather during fair week resulted in financial losses and the Fifteenth Annual Garrett County Fair, September 15, 16, 17 and 18, 1932, was the last until 1957.

Meetings were held early in 1954 to again organize a Garrett County Fair. H.G. Gortner, Allen S. Paugh, Sr. Walter DeBerry, Baity Ridder, and then County Extension Agent, John Carter, were among those instrumental in working out details for the first Garrett County Agriculture Fair, Inc. held August 13-17, 1957, on the property of Charles H. Bowman, near Deep Creek, McHenry, Maryland, where the present Fair is held.

Officers elected were H.G. Gortner, President; John J. Brenneman, Vice President; Charles A. Wilt, Secretary; Allen S. Paugh, Sr., Treasurer; and Claude W. Wagner, Sr., Manager. The Board of Directors was composed of sixteen men and four women to serve for four-year terms.

The property had one Quonset hut for the first fair. Other tents and temporary buildings were used to house the exhibits and animals. Many improvements have been made to the fair grounds through the years. Today Garrett County Fair stands as one of the true remaining agriculturally based fairs in the state.

After a successful pilot year, the Garrett County Fair Board is excited to announce we will have online entry available for all 4-H and open exhibitor categories. We anticipate the system will be online and available by June 5th. Please be aware that the launch date and availability of online registration is subject to change. We will post any changes to the launch of online entries, availability of online entries, and subsequent deadlines to register via our website. Facebook and available 4-H communication. Deadline for online entries is midnight July 14th, 2023. Online entry is optional for all categories except 4-H Livestock (continued below).

LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS Online entry will be mandatory for all 4-H/FFA livestock exhibitors. As mentioned above, online registration will be available starting June 5th unless otherwise communicated by means listed above. NEW FOR 2023: We are encouraging all 4-H members to also register any indoor exhibits with their livestock entries. While not mandatory, registering all entries online will save time on registration

day.

STALL REGISTRATION IS STILL REQUIRED TO BE SENT TO SUPERINTENDENTS BY JULY 1ST. PLEASE USE FORM FOUND IN BACK OF PREMIUM BOOK TO SAVE YOUR STALL SPACE.

In person registration will remain available for all OPEN exhibitor classes (including open livestock) and 4-H/FFA indoor exhibitor classes on Saturday July 29th from 10:00am until 4:00 pm.

All exhibitors shall submit a complete list of all items they intend to exhibit on the approved forms. These forms can be found in this premium book, www.garrettcountyfair.org, the Garrett County Extension Office (301-334-6960), or at the fair computer office. The entry process is as follows:

- Report to the computer office with the completed list of entries. You do not need to bring your entries.
- b. Obtain an exhibitor number from the staff.
- c. Take your completed list, exhibitor number and your entries to the appropriate section superintendent(s).
- d. When you have finished entering all of your exhibits, <u>return</u> your list to the computer office.
- Entries in the Garrett County Fair and eligibility for premiums is limited to Garrett County residents and nonresident taxpayers, except where otherwise noted.
- All premium checks need to be cashed within 60 days from the date of issue to settle any disputes.
- Pets, other than those for participation in the pet show, and special needs dogs, are not allowed on the Fairgrounds.
- 7. Possession or consumption of alcohol or drugs will not be permitted on the

Fairgrounds. This includes visitors and exhibitors. Violations of this rule will result in forfeiture of premiums and expulsion from the Fairgrounds.

- 8. Smoking in any building on the Fairgrounds is prohibited.
- The management of the Garrett County Fair will not be responsible for unsupervised youth that stay on the grounds. Any misconduct may result in expulsion from the Fairgrounds.
- 10. There is to be no sleeping in the barns between the hours of 11:00pm and 6:00am. All youth must be under adult supervision during these hours.
- 11. No unauthorized golf carts or 4-wheelers

Special Regulations

- · All persons enter at their own risk.
- Parents/Guardians are responsible for the supervision of all minors.
- · Not responsible for lost articles.
- No alcoholic beverages or controlled substances allowed.
- · No illegal or unlawful activity allowed.
- · No unauthorized demonstrations.
- · No soliciting.
- No distribution of any printed material/ flyers/advertisements, etc. except from designated commercial exhibits.
- No pets permitted on fairgrounds except Service Animals and animals being exhibited.
- All motorized vehicles (golf carts, gators, ATV's) and operators must be authorized by the Garrett County Fair Board, and operator must have a valid driver's license.
- The Garrett County Fair Board "Board") reserves the right (the to exclude from the Fairgrounds any person (exhibitor, spectator, parent of exhibitor, vendor, and admission-paying patron) who is in any manner disruptive or who inappropriate behavior that would disrupt the public. Such behavior shall include, but not be limited to, any public cursing, abusive belligerent language, or any language, clothing or conduct which causes others to feel threatened at

any time with respect to any activity conducted on the Fairgrounds. The Board may delegate such authority to impose any such sanction to its President or any officer of the Board or the Board's General Manager. Said sanction shall also include the right to temporarily or permanently ban participation in future events, whether or not they are sanctioned by the Board, or any third-party exhibitors or vendors, specifically, the Board may prohibit participation by individual persons who violate this policy from participating in Boardsanctioned exhibitions, classes or shows. In the event a person who has paid admission to the fairgrounds is asked to leave the premises, such admission shall be refunded upon that person leaving the premises.

No Selfie Sticks or Drones allowed at anytime. No Hover Boards or Skateboards Any banned item will be confiscated and NOT returned.

ALL VIOLATORS WILL BE IMMEDIATE-LY ESCORTED FROM THE PREMISES.

Exhibits

- Exhibits may be entered in the Garrett County Fair free of charge unless otherwise noted.
- All animals must be exhibited in the name of the owner; all products of the soil in the name of the producer; and articles of craftsmanship must be the handiwork of the exhibitor.
- An exhibitor may not enter the same item in more than one department nor any item exhibited in an open class be used as part of a group exhibit. (does not apply to livestock).
- Articles exhibited in the Garrett County Fair in previous years are barred from competition. (This does not apply to Livestock.)
- All Indoor Exhibits must be entered on Saturday, July 29, 2023 from 10:00 am to 4:00 pm.
- Indoor exhibits cannot be removed from the Fairgrounds until Sunday,

- August 6, 2023. All Exhibits must be picked up between 11:00 am and 1:00 pm. Items not picked up become the property of Garrett County Agriculture Fair. Garrett County Fair is not responsible for any exhibits not picked up or left after these times.
- Premium checks will be issued on Saturday, August 5, in the computer office. An announcement will be made when they are available. Checks not picked up on Saturday will be mailed.
- The Management of the Garrett County Fair will take every precaution to secure all entries at the Fair, but will not be responsible for damages or loss that may occur.
- In addition to these rules each exhibitor and entry is subject to each section and division rules.

Judging

- Competent Judges are secured. Judges will make their decisions in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Garrett County Fair.
- No one is allowed to serve as a judge of any class in which they exhibit. Departmental Superintendents may exhibit in their own departments.
- Judges may remove from competition any exhibitor attempting to interfere during judging.
- No premiums are awarded for Champion, Honorable Mention or Participation ribbons.

2023 MARYLAND ANIMAL HEALTH FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS

Ref: COMAR 15.11.14.06

The Maryland Department of Agriculture's (MDA), Animal Health Program strives to safeguard Maryland's animal industries at our fairs and shows. With an increased potential of disease transmission occurring when large numbers of animals gather for exhibition, MDA has set forth requirements for exhibitors to follow at Maryland fairs and shows. As an exhibitor, you can help reduce the potential risk of introduction and spread of infectious and/or contagious diseases by following the species-specific health requirements below.

IMPORTANT 2023 ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS TO MENTION:

1.CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (CVI):

a. The accredited veterinarian is required to send the original (white and canary) copies to MDA Headquarters within 7 days of completion.

2. LIVESTOCK:

- a. All cattle and swine must have an EID (electronic identification) or RFID (radio frequency identification) 840 tag. Cattle and swine with nonelectronic ID tags will be dismissed upon entry.
- b. All sheep and goats must have Scrapie Identification in the form of an official Scrapie Identification tag, or a legible and healed tattoo matching identification on breed registration paperwork.
- c. Livestock petting zoos and pony rides will be allowed with proper CVI, indicating rabies vaccination status, and self-certification documents.

3. POULTRY / AVIAN INFLUENZA TESTING:

a. All in- state poultry must be tested

for avian influenza within 30 days prior to the exhibition or originate from an NPIP U.S. H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean flock.

b. All out-of-state poultry must be tested for avian influenza within 21 days prior to the exhibition or originate from an NPIP U.S. H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean flock.

Maryland Law provides penalties for violations of Animal Health Law and Regulations. LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY FAILING TO MEET COMPLETE DOCUMENTATION OF ALL REQUIREMENTS WILL BE DENIED ENTRY OR REMOVED FROM THE EXHIBITION, "REJECTED". SEE ANIMAL REJECTION POLICY UNDER GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR FXHIBITORS.

REQUIREMENTS FOR SPONSORS OF A LIVESTOCK/POULTRY EXHIBITION (COMAR 15.11.14.05)

- 1. Notification: Exhibit sponsors must notify the Maryland Department of Agriculture (MDA), Animal Health Program Headquarters, 50 Harry S. Truman Parkway, Annapolis, MD 21401, of intent to sponsor an event that includes the exhibition of livestock or poultry no less than 30 days before the proposed event. Please fill out all contact information correctly, to include a phone number and email address. Animal arrival times MUST be provided to ensure coverage for entry. Please call 410-841-5810 to request an **EXHIBITION NOTIFICATION FORM** or go to MDA's website: http://mda. maryland.gov/animalhealth/pages/fairs -shows.aspx
- 2. Reporting: Sponsors must report to the Department any animal from

the exhibition suspected of having or showing obvious, apparent, or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease and/or deaths; and exclude from the exhibition premises any animals having obvious, apparent, or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease. A summary of all disease events shall be provided to MDA, in the form of an ANIMAL INCIDENT REPORT. Call 410-841-5810 to request an ANIMAL INCIDENT REPORT FORM or go to MDA's website: http://mda.maryland.gov/AnimalHealth/Pages/FairsShows.aspx

- 3. Records: Exhibit sponsors must maintain a report of the owner, premises location, and species of all animals attending the exhibition and provide this report upon request to MDA.
- 4. Exemptions: Exemptions of this regulation may be granted. (Refer to COMAR 15.11.14.05) GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITORS OF ALL ANIMAL SPECIES (COMAR 15.11.14.04-06)

Exhibitors at state, county, and district fairs, along with other livestock exhibitions, expositions, rodeos, shows, and swap meets are required to comply with regulatory provisions of the State of Maryland relating to animal health as noted in COMAR 15.11.14.04-06. Requirements apply to all livestock and poultry: Livestock is defined as those species of animals used for human food or fiber or those species of animals used for service to humans. This includes but is not limited to cattle. sheep, New World camelids (llamas & alpacas), goats, bison, privately owned cervids, swine, equine, and rabbits. Livestock does not include dogs, cats, and exotic pets. Poultry is defined as any living domestic bird raised for food or other purposes including, but not limited to, chicken, turkeys, ostriches, emus, rheas, cassowaries, other ratites, waterfowl, and game birds.

1. DOCUMENTATION: Documentation is required for entry of all livestock and poultry and is described below.

Examples of forms can be obtained by visiting the Animal Health website at: http://mda.maryland.gov/animalhealth/pages/fairs -shows.aspx. For out-of-state animals, see species specific out of state requirements. Upon request, a person who exhibits livestock shall present for inspection all reports, test charts, and appropriate health certificates required to accompany the livestock and poultry.

2. CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION is required for most entries.

- MARYLAND ENTRIES: All Maryland entries must be accompanied by a Maryland Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) for show, except poultry, equine and rabbits.
 - The Maryland CVI is valid for 120 days for fairs and shows, providing that the status of the herd or animal(s) does not change.
 - The Maryland CVI is a legible record, made on an official Maryland State form, issued by a Maryland accredited veterinarian, issued for animals being shown within the state and not crossing a state line, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland.
 - The Maryland CVI must be completed and signed by a Maryland accredited veterinarian using the proper selected report on the CVI form. Each animal must be properly identified on the CVI. The veterinarian must select if this document is for fair and exhibition season, sale or other (with explanation).
 - The veterinarian is required to send the original (white and canary) copies to MDA Headquarters within 7 days of completion, the middle (pink) transport copy is to be retained by the owner and should accompany livestock during travel. The last (goldenrod) copy is for the veterinarian's records.
- OUT-OF-STATE ENTRIES: All out-ofstate entries must be accompanied by an Interstate Certificate of

Veterinary Inspection, except poultry and rabbits.

- The Interstate CVI is valid for no more than 30 days from the date of inspection.
- An Interstate CVI must be legible, made on an official form of the state of origin, issued by an accredited veterinarian, and issued for animals being imported to this state within 30 days before the entry of the animals, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland.
- 3. SELF-CERTIFICATION: A completed Self-Certification is required for all entries except for equine entering equine-only events. Self-Certification forms must be filled out within 24 hours prior to loading and presented upon request to the designated representative.
 - A Self-Certification is an official Maryland document signed by the owner/caretaker/transporter stating that the animals presented for exhibition are not showing any signs of or having recent exposure to (within 21 days) infectious or contagious diseases.
 - Self-Certification forms are speciesspecific for livestock (ruminants, swine), equine, poultry and rabbits.
 These forms are available on MDA's Animal Health website: http://mda. maryland.gov/animalhealth/pages/ fairs-shows.aspx
- 4. TEST REPORT FORMS. Testing is required for some species, and if so, a test report form will be required unless otherwise documented on the CVI. See species-specific requirements for details of testing and test report requirements. Examples of test reports: Avian Influenza Testing Report Coggins Test Report (Equine Infectious Anemia) Pullorum-Typhoid Testing Report Tuberculosis Test Report
- 5. MARYLAND POULTRY PREMISES IDENTIFICATION All Maryland premises with poultry are required to be registered with the Maryland Department of Agriculture. The Poultry Premises number must be noted on the

Test Report or other documentation of NPIP U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid and U.S. H5/ H7 Avian Influenza Clean or State H5/H7 Monitored status.

6. ANIMAL REJECTION POLICY.

Animals may be rejected from an

- 6. ANIMAL REJECTION POLICY. Animals may be rejected from an exhibition, either denied entry or removed from the exhibition, as described below:
 - a. FAILURE TO PROVIDE
 COMPLETED DOCUMENTATION IS
 GROUNDS FOR REJECTION.
 b. FOR A SKIN LESION
 SUSPICIOUS OF RINGWORM
 TO BE CONSIDERED NO
 LONGER CONTAGIOUS TO
 OTHER ANIMALS OR PEOPLE,
 NEW WOOL OR HAIR MUST
 COMPLETELY COVER THAT
 I FSION
 - c. Livestock with clinical signs of infectious or contagious diseases or external parasites are not permitted entry or allowed to remain at the exhibition. Clinical signs include but are not limited to: active lesions of ringworm with resulting loss of hair, sore mouth, sore nose, caseous lymphadenitis, mange, or multiple warts easily visible without close examination.
 - d. Suspicion of communicable disease is adequate grounds for rejection. Confirmed diagnosis is not required, since timely removal of suspicious animals is required by law to protect the remaining animals.
 - e. Exposed animals may be rejected: If it is believed that there is a potentially serious communicable disease present, all animals originating with the suspect animal may be rejected. Vesicular diseases are of particular concern.
 - f. All decisions are final.
 - g. All parties involved will be notified of all rejections, including exhibit sponsors and supervisors.
 - h. Animal rejections can be made by MDA Animal Health veterinarians or field inspectors, private veterinarians contracted by the show, Maryland Extension employees, or individuals designated by the fair or show as a 'responsible person.'

SPECIES-SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

In addition to the general requirements above, specific requirements by species are shown for the following species: Cattle, Swine, Sheep, Goats, Horses, Ponies, Mules and other Equidae Poultry, Rabbits, Camelids

ALL CATTLE IDENTIFICATION:

INDIVIDUAL IDENTIFICATION OF EACH ANIMAL SHALL BE AN RFID OFFICIAL EAR TAG.

Rodeo Cattle

must have official individual ID that is recognized by the USDA. Rodeo Cattle are NOT allowed to commingle with any other cattle at the exhibition.

Maryland Cattle

Brucellosis: Maryland is a Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland cattle.

Tuberculosis: Maryland is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Maryland cattle.

Immunization: Bovine Respiratory Disease Complex vaccination is required for all Maryland cattle to include Bovine Respiratory Syncytial Virus, Bovine Viral Diarrhea virus, Infectious Bovine Rhinotracheitis and Parainfluenza. Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended.

Out-of-State Cattle

Brucellosis:

- 1. Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State, Region or Zone
- a. No brucellosis test required.
- 2. Non-Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State, Region or Zone
- a. Official vaccinates under 24 months old with vaccination dates recorded on the Interstate CVI permitted, or
- b. Test negative within 30 days before entry.

Tuberculosis:

1. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State, Region or Zone

- a. No tuberculin test required.
- 2. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
- a. All cattle over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
- i. Cattle must originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test may be imported without a tuberculin test. or
- ii. Any individual animal, over 6 months of age, entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
- b. Status of herd and area must be shown on certificate.

ALL SWINE IDENTIFICATION:

INDIVIDUAL IDENTIFICATION OF EACH ANIMAL SHALL BE AN RFID OFFICIAL EAR TAG.

Maryland Swine

Brucellosis: Maryland is a Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland swine. Pseudorabies: Maryland is a Pseudorabies Stage V state. Pseudorabies testing is not required for Maryland swine. Immunization: Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended.

Out-of-State Swine

Brucellosis: All swine, except barrows, 6 months of age and older shall be negative on an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition entry, or originate directly from a validated brucellosis-free herd or brucellosis-free state.

Pseudorabies: Swine over 6 months of age shall be negative on an official test for pseudorabies conducted within 30 days prior to exhibition entry, or originate immediately and directly from a Qualified Pseudorabies Negative herd or Stage 4 or Stage 5 Pseudorabies-Free State.

Immunization: Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended.

ALL SHEEP

Identification for Sheep: All sheep must be officially scrapie-identified. Official identification for sheep includes the following:

- 1. USDA-approved scrapie ear tags;
- 2. Legible registration tattoos, for which the breed registration paper shall contain the registry premises or flock tattoo prefix that is linked to the APHIS-assigned PIN and flock ID number of the flock of birth, if breed registry is approved by APHIS; or 3. Legible tattoos consisting of an individual animal number unique within the flock in one ear and the official scrapie premises identification number (flock ID) in the other ear, except where the tail web or flank may be used for earless animals or animals with damaged ears; must be accompanied by an owner statement.
- 4. A microchip ID with official scrapie identification is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.
- 5. RFID tags. Further clarification on the Federal Scrapie Program can be found at: https://www.aphis.usda.gov/ aphis/ourfocus/animalhealth/animaldisease-information/sheep-and-goathealth/national-scrapie-eradicationprogram/

Out-of-State Sheep

No additional requirements.

Market Lambs

It is recommended that all lambs be slick shorn prior to entry for inspection for club lamb fungus.

ALL GOATS

Identification for Goats: All goats must be officially scrapie-identified. Official identification for goats includes the following:

- 1. USDA-approved scrapie ear tags;
- 2. Legible registration tattoos, for which the breed registration paper shall contain the registry premises or flock tattoo prefix that is linked to the APHIS-assigned PIN and flock ID number of the flock of birth, if breed registry is approved by APHIS; or

- 3. Legible tattoos consisting of an individual animal number unique within the herd in one ear and the official scrapie premises identification number (flock ID) in the other ear, except where the tail web or flank may be used for earless animals or animals with damaged ears; must be accompanied by an owner statement.
- 4. A microchip ID with official scrapie identification is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.
- 5. RFID tags.Further clarification on the Federal Scrapie Program can be found at:https://www.aphis.usda.gov/ aphis/ourfocus/animalhealth/animaldisease-information/sheep-and-goathealth/national-scrapie-eradicationprogram/

Maryland Goats

Brucellosis: Maryland is a Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland goats. Tuberculosis: Maryland is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Maryland goats.

Out-of-State Goats

Tuberculosis:

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free States, Region or Zone: No tuberculin test required.
- 2. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
- a. All goats over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
- i. Goats must originate from herds in which all animals are tested negative within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test, may be imported without a tuberculin test, or
- ii. Any individual animal entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
- b. Status of herd and area must be shown on certificate.

ALL EQUINE

Identification: Individual official

identification shall include the following as applicable: EIA test report with photo or drawing of the animal, tattoo, brand, or microchip. Animals using tattoos or brands for official identification must be accompanied with the breed registration papers.

Equine Infectious Anemia (Coggins) Testing: All equine for exhibition shall be accompanied by a valid Coggins Test done within 12 months prior to exhibition entry.

Self-Certification Requirement and Exemption: Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health is required for each equine entering a fair/show-type event where multiple livestock species are present. The form must be available for inspection if requested. Those participating in equine-only shows and events are exempt from this requirement: however, it is good practice to thoroughly double check the health and skin condition of the animal before departing for the event. The form provides an easy checklist to do this. Exhibitors may not bring an animal having apparent or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease to a show.

Maryland Equine

1. All horses and other Equidae, 9 months of age and older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) made within the 12 months before the date of the event. A copy of this test shall accompany every animal.

2. A Maryland CVI is not required for Maryland equine.

Out-of-State Equine

1. All horses and other Equidae, 9 months of age and older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) made within the 12 months before the date of the event. A copy of this test shall accompany every animal.

2. All horses and other Equidae shall be accompanied by a CVI issued within 30 days prior to entry. An Interstate CVI must be legible, made on an official form from the state of origin, issued by an accredited veterinarian, and issued for animals being imported to this state within 30 days before the entry of the animals, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of

ALL POULTRY

1. PRIVATE SALES WILL BE

Maryland Poultry

- 1. Premises Registration: All poultry exhibitors originating from Maryland must have valid proof of a registered Maryland Poultry Premises ID Number.
- 2. Avian Influenza (AI) Testing Requirements: All poultry, including wild birds except pigeons and doves, shown at public exhibitions in this state shall meet one of the following AI testing requirements:
- i. Originate directly from an NPIP U.S. H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean Flock as defined in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations, or from a State Avian Influenza Monitored Flock as defined by the state of origin, OR
- ii. Have a negative avian influenza test conducted on at least 15 birds from their flock (or complete flock if fewer than 15 birds) within 30 days prior to event and remain segregated from all birds of unknown or positive avian influenza test status.

- 3. Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid Testing Requirements: All poultry, except waterfowl, wild birds, pigeons and doves, shown at public exhibitions in this state shall meet one or more of the following requirements:
- i. Originate directly from an NPIP U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flock as defined in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants), OR
- ii. Have a negative official test for Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid within 90 days before fair, exhibition, exposition, or show and remain segregated from all poultry of unknown or positive Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid test status.

Out-of- State Poultry

- 1. Avian Influenza (ÅI) Testing Requirements: All poultry, including wild birds except pigeons and doves, shown at public exhibitions in this state shall meet one of the following Al testing requirements:
- i. Originate directly from an NPIP U.S. H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean Flock as defined in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations, or from a State Avian Influenza Monitored Flock as defined by the state of origin, OR
- ii. Have a negative avian influenza test conducted on at least 30 birds from their flock (or complete flock if fewer than 30 birds) within 21 days prior to the event and remain segregated from all birds of unknown or positive avian influenza test status.
- 2. Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid Testing Requirements: All poultry except waterfowl, wild birds, pigeons and doves shown at public exhibitions in this state shall meet one or more of the following requirements:
- i. Originate directly from a U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flock as defined in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants).OR

ii. Have a negative official test for Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid within 90 days before fair, exhibition, exposition, or show and remain segregated from all poultry of unknown or positive Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid test status.

ALL RABBITS

- 1. See Rabbit Waiver: Rabbits are not required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- 2. Identification: Individual identification of each animal shall be a tag, tattoo, or microchip, if the exhibitor provides the reader.
- All rabbit exhibitors shall complete a Rabbit Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health.

ALL CAMELIDS

Identification: Individual identification of each animal shall be an official metal ear tag or microchip, if the exhibitor provides the reader.

Maryland Camelids

Brucellosis: Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland camelids. Tuberculosis: Tuberculin test is not required for Maryland camelids.

Out-Of-State Camelids

Brucellosis: Brucellosis testing is not required for out-of-state camelids. Tuberculosis:

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State, Region, or Zone
- a. No tuberculin test required.
- 2. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
- a. All camelids over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
- i. Camelids must originate from a herd not under restriction or quarantine for tuberculosis and from which a complete herd test was conducted within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test may be imported without a tuberculin test, or
- ii. Any individual animal, over 6 months of age, entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
- b. Status of herd and area must be shown on certificate.

Carmichael followed it up in 2021 with Son Of A, another neo-traditional gem that's racked up more than 13 million streams across platforms (Carmichael's catalog boasts more than 140 million streams collectively) and yielded similarly glowing reviews for its feel-good mix of wry humor and raw heart. After debuting as the #1 most-added single at country radio, the album's title track is already well on its way to a million plays on YouTube as it continues to climb the singles charts. Carmichael remains busy as ever on the road in 2022, headlining his 'Son Of A' Tour and opening for the likes of Brooks & Dunn, Cody Johnson, Brothers Osborne, and more.



GENERAL RULES

DRAG RACING AREA:

- All drag racing will be conducted on a dirt surface.
- Two side-by-side lanes will be marked by a white chalk line.
- 3. The normal drag race track will be set at 200' with 150' stopping area.
- It will be the determination of the officials to cancel racing if unsafe weather conditions are present.

DRAG RACING REGISTRATION RULES:

- 1. All drivers and pit personnel must sign a release waiver to participate in the event.
- 2. Only trucks that are licensed and tagged for street use are allowed to participate.
- Trucks must be driven to the track. NO TRAILERS ALLOWED.
- For the Run What You Brung class, you can race whatever you bring if there is another comparable vehicle to race against. If it runs down the track, you can race it.
- Vehicles will be inspected and it will be determined by the tech officials if you will be allowed to run.
- 6. We will offer double elimination this year. The cost of your second run is \$20.
- If gas tanks have been moved, they must be secured.
- 8. HELMETS AND SEATBELTS MUST BE WORN WHILE ON THE TRACK
- 9. A current valid driver's license and insurance certificate are required for the driver. Any driver under the age of 18 must have a parent present and that parent must sign the parental consent form.
- No alcoholic beverages are permitted. Any driver or pit person under the influence will be immediately disqualified and removed from the grounds with no refund.

11. Anyone wishing to participate in the Grudge Racing event after the main event must have their vehicles in the pit area BEFORE the main event has started. No vehicles will be permitted into the pit area after the event has started. NO EXCEPTIONS.

CONDUCT OF DRAG RACING EVENT;

- 1. You must pay regular admission to the fair at the main gate. This does NOT count as your entry into the pits. General admission is charged by the fair, not Intimidation Motorsports, and is separate from participating in track events. The registration fee for this event is \$30 per vehicle; \$10 is paid at the pit gate, and \$20 is paid when you register your vehicle. Any additional pit helpers will pay a \$10 pit fee. There will be no reimbursements or refunds of any kind for any reason.
- 2. All vehicles participating in the grudge race will pay an entry fee of \$10 per race.
- 3. The order and bracket set up will be determined prior to the start of the first round by chip pulls.
- Drivers must stay with their vehicles while their class is participating. Failure to remain with your vehicle can result in disqualification.
- 5. Any vehicle that touches the white line will be disgualified.
- After their run, winners must return to the staging area immediately in order to stage for the next round.
- No speeding or reckless driving in the pit area. This can result in disqualification/ ejection from the event.
- All drag racing decisions made by the officials are FINAL with no appeal process.

- 8. No loose objects in a vehicle. No added weights.
- Vehicles must have a secure pullback hitch. NO CLEVIS PROVIDED
- No riders allowed in the vehicle during competition.
- No one allowed in the competition area except officials
- The course will be marked. Crossing boundaries will result in disqualification.
- Stop immediately if you make it through the pit. If you continue to drag the cable into the pits, you will be disqualified.

- 14. You will be stopped by the official if they feel the vehicle can no longer move forward under its own power in the pit. No backing up.
- 15. You will be permitted to run once in each class.
- No reckless driving or speeding anywhere in the pit area.
- 17. No nitrous oxide or combustion accelerators.
- Vehicles will be classified by wheel size only, NOT wheelbase or engine size.
- 19. Vehicles must be registered no later than one hour before starting time.
- 20. You must pay regular admission to the fair at the main gate. This does NOT count as your entry into the pits. General admission is charged by the fair, not Intimidation Motorsports, and is separate from participating in track events. The registration fee for this event consists of \$10 which is paid at the pit gate, and the \$10 or \$20 (depending on class) which is paid when you register your vehicle at the fairgrounds. Any additional pit helpers will pay a \$10 pit fee. There will be no reimbursements or refunds of any kind for any reason.
- 21. The same truck can run in the same class as long as it is a different driver.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

These rules are designed to ensure a fair, equal, and consistent inspection process, as well as to ensure the safety of all drivers, spectators, and staff.

GENERAL RULES

- Pre-ran cars must be approved by Intimidation Motorsports before the show. Please message us through our Facebook page to discuss. Don't assume you'll be allowed to run just because you showed up with the vehicle.
- All drivers must sign in and register no later than 1 hour prior to start time which is when inspection and registration close. Vehicle must be in line for inspection before closing time
- 3. All rules will be enforced. Follow them or you will not run. We understand that people will bend the rules, push allowances to the max, or think of things we haven't thought of yet. The official's decision for any situation that arises is final. We can always address things at the next drivers' meeting. If you have questions, please message us through our Facebook page to discuss before doing something.
- Every driver and every crew person MUST sign the release waiver. Every driver over the age of 18 without a valid driver's license MUST present a valid state-issued ID card for all classes except lawn mowers.
- Participants in all classes who are under the age of 18 are also required to submit a signed parental consent form and a parent must be present during the derby. NO ONE UNDER 16 YEARS OF AGE IS PERMITTED TO DRIVE IN ANY CLASS EXCEPT THE LAWN MOWER CLASS. NO EXCEPTIONS.
- 6. The promoter or tech inspectors reserve the right to approve or reject any or all entries, and have the final say. If you feel something is a gray area, call or message us so we can clarify for you BEFORE the event so your time and ours is not wasted. The officials' decision is final.
- 7. If your vehicle doesn't pass inspection and changes are not made to pass inspection, your vehicle will not participate. You have two chances to pass tech. If you don't pass the second time, you will not run.
- If any round or square tubing, plating, or welding is found, in or out of the frame, you will not run. You will not be given the option to remove it, and you will not be issued any

refunds of any kind.

- Officials reserve the right to re-inspect any vehicle at any time before, during, or after the event. Any vehicles due to receive prize money are subject to inspection before any prize is paid out.
- All drivers must attend the drivers meeting. If you are not present for it, you will not participate.
- 11. If you have any questions about something you wish to do to your car that is not covered in the rules, please contact us prior to doing it to determine whether or not it is permitted.
- 12. You must pay regular admission to the fair at the main gate. This does NOT count as your entry into the pits. General admission is charged by the fair, not Intimidation Motorsports, and is separate from participating in track events. The registration fee for this event is \$40 per car/driver; \$10 is paid at the pit gate, and \$30 is paid when you register your vehicle at the fairgrounds. (A \$5 discount will be offered to all drivers who preregister before July 4, 2023.) Any additional pit helpers will pay a \$10 pit fee. There will be no reimbursements or refunds of any kind for any reason.
- 13. Being under the influence of drugs or alcohol will not be tolerated by anyone on the premises. If a driver or pit crew member is found consuming alcohol or drugs or being under the influence of alcohol or drugs, you will be disqualified from the events with no refunds, and the matter will be turned over to the local authorities.
- 14. Fighting or other misconduct on the track, in the pits, or in the stands will not be tolerated. All parties will be suspended from all events operated by Intimidation Motorsports for a period of one full year. Any registration fees, including pre-registration fees, will not be refunded.
- 15. Any driver or crew member disobeying the rules will cause their car to be disqualified. Unsportsmanlike conduct will not be tolerated and will be grounds for disqualification and barred from future events. Drivers are responsible for their actions and the actions of their crew members. All drivers and pit crew are to obey track officials at all times.
- 16. Intimidation Motorsports will not be responsible for any theft, accident, or damage to persons and/or property caused by anyone at any time, including drivers



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- or crew, on the track, in the pit area, or anywhere else at the event.
- Children in the pit area MUST remain with an adult AT ALL TIMES.
- You will be allowed one rollover. If the vehicle is deemed safe, you may run it again. If you flip a second time, you are out.
- 19. If a car gets stuck on a tire or another vehicle, they must still actively try to get unstuck and make a hit within the one minute time frame or will be counted out. Vehicles will only be unhooked if the vehicles hooked are the last two running in the feature.
- 20. All drivers must remain aggressive and must make a hit every minute NO SANDBAGGING OR TAG TEAMING ALLOWED; YOU WILL ONLY BE WARNED ONCE BEFORE BEING DISQUALIFIED. The one minute time limit is enforced by track officials for restarts and for making AGGRESSIVE contact with another live car. This does NOT mean simply bumping another car. If you're hung up and making a strong effort to get free, you may be given more time. If you are sandbagging, you may get less time. THIS IS AN OFFICIAL'S DECISION.
- You will only be allowed 2 vehicle fires. You
 may run after the first fire, but if you catch fire
 again, you're out.
- 22. No saving of parking spaces in the pit.
- After a vehicle is inspected, it must go to the lineup area and not to the pit stall. If you're caught back in your pit before you run and after you have been inspected, YOU WILL BE DISQUALIFIED.
- 24. Driver MUST be present for inspection, and may ONLY bring ONE mechanic to inspection. NO ONE ELSE IS PERMITTED IN THE INSPECTION AREA. NO EXCEPTIONS!!!
- 25. The promoter and the fair association will not be held responsible for any cars, parts, or personal property before, during, or after the event. All vehicles must be removed from the track and pit areas before the end of the night.
- 26. All glass, plastic, and pot metal must be removed. Nothing is to remain in the bottom of the doors or trunk. Vehicle must be swept clean. No junk tires, trash, wheels, metal parts, broken glass, etc. allowed in car.
- Front dash may remain in the vehicle or you may remove it.
- 28. Driver's door panel may be left in place.
- All outer hardware must be removed, including door handles, mirrors, chrome, molding, fiberglass, etc.
- All glass must be removed including windshield, side windows, rear window, sunroof, headlights, and tail lights.
- 31. All flammable material must be removed.
- 32. All airbags must be removed!!!! You will not

- run with them still in your car.
- 33. The car's computer may be relocated and secured with spray foam.
- 34. Front seat must be securely bolted to the floor.
- 35. All cars MUST have a roof sign for numbers. YOU WILL NOT RUN WITHOUT A ROOF SIGN. Drivers will place their number on a sign and secure it to the roof of their car so the announcer can easily see the number. Roof signs are for identification only. Roof signs must be no bigger than 24" long by 24" tall, and must be securely fastened with a bolt through the roof. NO PROFANITY WILL BE ALLOWED ON ANY PORTION OF THE VEHICLE. You will be required to cover it up or not run.
- All cars are encouraged to have a number on both the driver's and passenger's doors.
- All cars MUST have their driver's doors painted white or a fluorescent color. You will not run without it.
- 38. Functioning safety belts, DOT approved helmets, eye protection (safety glasses, goggles, or face shields), long pants, long sleeve shirts/jackets, and boots are MANDATORY. Neck braces are encouraged.
- 39. Drivers must remain in their vehicles with their helmet and seatbelt on until the event is over unless you are fleeing the vehicle for safety reasons during a red flag. Vehicle and driver will be disqualified for the event if either are removed beforehand.
- 40. Driver's door may be foamed for protection.
- 41. You cannot have too much driver's door protection. Angle iron/fence post is NOT driver's door protection. If you show up with just angle iron/fence post, then you will have to find better door protection before you get a stick to run. WE CANNOT STRESS ENOUGH HOW IMPORTANT THIS RULE IS
- 42. No deliberate hitting on a driver's door. THIS WILL RESULT IN DISQUALIFICATION
- Cars are to remain in the designated derby area while competing.
- 44. All vehicles must have dependable brakes at all times.
- A vehicle will be disqualified if any door comes open during the event.
- 46. No one is permitted to ride on the outside of a car at any time; this includes while the vehicle is being removed from the track.
- 47. Feature winners will be determined by the last car running that makes contact with another car within the allotted time. If two cars get hung up on the last hit, we will separate the cars one time.

4 & 6 CYL COMPACT CAR CHAIN AND BANG RULES

PAYOUTS:

1ST PLACE \$1,000 plus trophy
2ND PLACE \$300 plus trophy
3RD PLACE \$200 plus trophy
INTIMIDATOR AWARD: \$50 plus trophy

VEHICLE REQUIREMENTS

- Any factory built 4 or 6 cylinder compact car with a 110" wheelbase or less is permitted.
- No 8 cylinder cars allowed.
- All RWD vehicles will run in this class, NOT the Intimidation class. NO EXCEPTIONS
- No t-tops or convertibles allowed.
- No engine swaps. AWD cars must remove one driveshaft.
- No welding anywhere except seat bar and driver's door.
- Drivers may bring multiple cars to participate in any or all of the classes offered.
- 8. A pre-registration discount of \$5 will be offered to all derby drivers.
- Any modifications other than what has been described in these rules will lead to disqualification.

BODY PREPARATION

- 1. No wedge cars, creasing, bending, forming, or body shaping anywhere on the car.
- No all thread anywhere on the car.
- Fenders and quarter panels may be cut away for clearance, but must remain stock angle.
- All body mounts, bolts, rubber, washers, spacers, etc. must be factory and must remain in factory location.
- Driver's door may be welded shut. Other doors must be chained or wired shut in 6 spots max per door.
- Body mounts must be factory, no aftermarket bolts.
- 7. Fresh car means fresh and not pre-bent. You will not run if you pre-bend a fresh car.

HOODS AND TRUNKS

- All cars must run a hood.
- 2. Hood MUST be open for inspection.
- Hood must be wired, chained, or bolted shut in at least two spots. This will be done AFTER inspection when you line up immediately after inspection.
- Hood and trunk lids may be wired or chained in up to 6 locations. No bolting down the trunk lid.
- Hood and trunk lid MUST have a 12" x 12" access holes in them for inspection and safety.
- 6. Hood overhang may be cut off or folded down.
- 7. Trunk lid may be tucked down in the center halfway, but may not be attached to the floor.
- 8. Sunroofs must be covered, NO

EXCEPTIONS.

- Trunk lids are allowed to be removed.
- 10. No other welding is allowed at all unless it is specifically mentioned within these rules.

STEERING AND SUSPENSION

- No modifications to the steering or suspension allowed. Must be the stock OEM equipment for that vehicle.
- A-arms must be factory. No aftermarket A-arms or added metal plates.
- Struts must be factory. No aftermarket struts.
- Coil springs may be wired in.
- Inspectors may drill or unbolt as necessary if they think that something has been tampered to ensure that all rules are being followed.
- Car must bounce.

BRAKES AND TIRES

- Car must have working brakes at all times.
- Any tire/rim combo is allowed. Four wheels max per car. No dual tires.
- No split rims or studded tires.
- 4. Wheel weights must be removed.
- 5. Tire flaps are allowed.
- Valve stem protectors are allowed.
- 7. Tubing tires are allowed.

FRAME/UNIBODY

- No frame or unibody welding of any kind allowed.
- No filling frame or body holes with spray foam.
- Crush boxes cannot be removed or altered. Leave it stock.
- If you have frame repair questions, message Intimidation Motorsports through our Facebook page before you come to the show for instructions on how to fix it.

BUMPERS

- Bumpers must be stock OEM. No gussets.
- Bumper may be welded to bracket, then the bracket welded to the frame with no additional material.
- 3. Must have inspection hole on each side.
- If you're not using brackets, bumper may be hardnosed using a 5" x 5" x ½" plate welded to the end of the frame.
- Frame rails may be shortened and must be no further back than the front of the core support. No extra material will be allowed in the frame. It will be checked or drilled.
- 6. 4" x 4" x ¼" square tubing is permitted for bumper with no end cap. You may use 5" x 5" x ¼" plates for mounting to frame. Bumper may be chain or 9 wire with 2 links on the top and 2 links on the bottom welded to the frame. Chain must have slack in it. No round pipe allowed. No pointies. No gussets.
- If you have any questions, please contact us through our Facebook page or group to discuss.



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COOLING SYSTEMS

- Radiator must be stock OEM or less, only mount in factory location or be removed.
- Radiators are water only. Antifreeze must be removed.
- No homemade radiators or reservoir tanks allowed.
- Air conditioner equipment must be drained or removed.
- Radiators may be spray foamed in place.

- Electric fuel pumps are allowed. An ON/ OFF switch must be mounted to either side of the steering column on the dash with the OFF in the down position. Fuel line must run inside of the car or run over the dash, and hood must have a notch for them. Fuel line must be HIGH PRESSURE FUEL LINE. All connections must be double clamped.
- Alcohol is permitted, but MUST have colored dye in it which will be verified by inspectors. Cars running alcohol will be marked for easy identification by the fire fighters.
- 8. A minimum of 3" x 3" round or square tubing is mandatory, or you may use a four bar enclosure around the inside cab, which is recommended for safety. Two long bars, one behind seat, one across dash area, one across each door. The tubing must not exceed 4" diameter. Sidebars on the cage must not exceed more than 18" past the center door post. A 4" diameter downbar from each door post per side is permitted, with a maximum of 4" plates. No more than one downbar per side is permitted.
- 9. A single rollover bar may be welded or bolted to the cage only, not to the floor. Bar must be straight down in two spots. Rollover bars cannot be 10" past the center post. The rollover bar must be behind the driver's seat. Rollover bar may be bolted or welded in two spots on the front side of the rollover bar only.
- 10. Cages are allowed, but must be a four point cage. For a four point cage, you are allowed one 4" x 4" leg on each side of the car going to the floor. The down legs must be in the front door area only. No legs on the back

- side of the cage. No gussets on a four point cage.
- Cage must be 5" off of the floor and cannot be higher than 5" below the window area of the doors.
- 12. A chain, cable, bar, or #9 wire must be used in the front windshield area from the cowl to the roof. This is for the driver's protection.
- #9 wire will be limited inside the car. Only one strand per side in the back seat area connecting the floor to the roof.
- 14. Driver's door protection is allowed to go 10" from the front driver's door seam forward AND 10" past the B pillar (driver's door seam). The door protection overlap rule is for the outside of the door. If you use door protection inside the car, then you must go by the cage rule.
- 15. Speaker deck must remain stock and intact in the car.

LAWN MOWER RULES

PAYOUTS:

1ST PLACE \$100 + 50% entry fees, plus trophy 2ND PLACE \$50 plus trophy 3RD PLACE \$25 plus trophy

All general setup and safety rules apply for this class. This class is designed for, but not limited to, beginner drivers and new enthusiasts to join the sport. Therefore, we will not allow any strengthening of tractors unless noted for safety purposes.

Just because it is not stated in the rules does not mean you can do it. Officials have the final call on any discussed topic of issues not meeting the rules. If you have questions, message us through our Facebook page to discuss.

RULES:

- Functioning safety belts, DOT approved helmets, eye protection (either safety glasses, goggles, or face shields), long pants, long sleeve shirts/jackets, and boots are MANDATORY.
- Tractor will remain stock from factory unless addressed in the rules.
- 3. Pre-run or damaged tractors must meet all
- 4. NO HITTING IN THE REAR OF OTHER TRACTORS.
- The garden lawnmower must have a factory frame. Homemade frames and/or adding metal to frames is NOT PERMITTED.
- ABSOLUTELY NO WELDING OF ANY KIND IS ALLOWED ANYWHERE ON THE TRACTOR unless specifically stated in these rules.
- Mowers must be factory available mowers or garden tractors.
- 8. Mowers must be front engine mowers. Rear engine mowers are NOT PERMITTED.
- 9. All mowers must be belt driven someplace.

11. Vertical shaft engine only.

- No engine brace or cradles. May run spark plug protector, but must only be connected to the engine.
- 13. No pulley swaps.
- Steering must be stock.
- 15. No modified spindles. Must remain stock to that tractor.
- Ignition must be stock. A push button and toggle switch may be used if stock is damaged or unusable.
- 17. Exhaust must be straight up, minimum 10" from the top of the hood, maximum 15".
- Gas tank must be put in a safe spot and covered.
- Battery must be put in a safe area and covered.
- Tires and rims are to remain stock with no modifications
- Transaxle must be factory. Reinforcing or spider gears are allowed.
- 22. MUST RUN A METAL HOOD AND GRILL. Hood must be in factory location. Top of engine must be covered. Sides of stock hood may be cut off. Hood must be secure, welded, bolted, or screwed on. NO PLASTIC ALLOWED Tin only. If stock hood is plastic or fiberglass, you may use 1/8" max plate to make one. Can be seam welded, riveted, or screwed together. No added reinforcement. Can run two 3/4" piece of all thread through the front frame up through the hood.
- Brakes must work. Forward and reverse must also work.
- 24. No bumpers allowed.
- 25. Gas tank must be fastened with the cap on. If it comes loose or leaks gas, you will be disqualified. Gas tank must be located in a safe place and protected. No gas tanks allowed under the seat.
- 26. LEG GUARDS ARE MANDATORY. MUST BE SOLID AND SECURED OR YOU WILL NOT RUN. They must go from rear fender to front foot rest or frame. It may go to front of hood, but it must not touch the hood. NO EXCEPTIONS. You must have ankle protection. It is to be maximum 1/8" plate from outside of leg guard to foot rest. Must be no higher than 20" from ground and no lower than axle to spindle from ground to side bars. Guard/cage frame must be made out of 2" x 1/8" minimum material. Must run a back bar from top of fenders up behind the seat. May run 2 kickers down to cage/side bars. Kickers must not come past the front of rear fenders.
- NO MOWER DECKS ALLOWED!! You must remove all plastic items and headlights

- except for the hood.
- Exhaust stacks must be straight. No angle cuts allowed.
- 29. If driver rolls over or any part of their body touches the track, you will be flipped back over and allowed to continue running. If driver rolls over again or if any part of their body touches the track for a second time, the driver will be disqualified.
- In the event of a rollover, the heat will be stopped until the officials get the mower back upright.
- MUST HAVE HOOD SIGN WITH NUMBER. Put your number on a hood sign with NO SHARP EDGES.
- 32. Front wheels must be a minimum of 6" and a maximum of 10". Rear wheels must be a minimum of 8" and a maximum of 12". Stock wheels only. Tractor/Ag tires only NO ATV, AUTO, OR SOLID TIRES ARE ALLOWED. No wheel weights or bead locks allowed. Tire chains may be used on REAR tires ONLY. If using tire chains, they must be wired or bolted together so they cannot come off for safety purposes. AIR ONLY IN TIRES! NO dual tire setups.
- Fender shifters must have a protective guard/ cage around them. May be plated solid, but the rest of the back and side cage cannot be plated.
- 34. No teaming or hold and hit. ALL INVOLVED WILL BE DISQUALIFIED.
- Do not go past officials on the track OR YOU WILL BE DISQUALIFIED. Stay in your allowed arena space.
- If it's not in the rules and you have any questions or think something is a gray area, get in touch with us and we will clarify it for you.
- If your tractor does not comply with these rules, you will not run. NO EXCEPTIONS AND NO REFUNDS.
- 38. ALL RULES ARE AT THE OFFICIAL'S DISCRETION WITH REGARD TO PRE-RUN TRACTORS, QUESTIONS, AND GRAY AREAS.

If it is not stated that you can do something in the rules, DO NOT DO IT. No gray area builds. If you have questions, get a hold of us ahead of time.

2023 Power Wheels Derby SATURDAY ONLY - AUGUST 5

The Power Wheels Derby will be held at the fair on Saturday, August 5th. Start time is approximately 5:00 pm, after registration for the demolition derby has closed. Please have your child(ren) registered no later than 4:45 pm. Both Power Wheels Derby classes (stock and modified) must be completed with everyone and every vehicle off the track no later than 6 pm so we can begin the adult demolition derby. There will be trophies for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place and crowd's choice winners of each class. All other participants will receive a medal.

MODIFIED POWER WHEELS DERBY RULES:

- Any regular electric Power Wheels vehicle is allowed. No 4-wheeler or tractor type vehicles allowed. The child's legs must be inside the compartment. The child must ride IN, not ride on, the vehicle.
- 2. Children ages 5 to 10 years old may participate in the modified class.
- Helmets MUST be worn. A full face helmet is recommended.
- Seatbelts MUST be installed, functioning, and wore at all times.
- NO PASSENGERS ALLOWED.
- Drill batteries, lawn mower batteries, car batteries are allowed. All batteries must be covered and placed in a safe location to prevent injury to the child, including injuries caused by battery acid.
- Upgraded motors/gearboxes allowed. Only electric motors allowed. Motors must be no larger than 775's. No scooter motors or electric go-cart motors allowed.
- Chassis must have originally been on a child's ride-on car or truck. No go-cart chassis or riding mower chassis allowed.
- All doors and tailgates should be taped or strapped shut. No sharp edges. You may use zip ties, duct tape, or any other flexible product for making them stay shut.
- 10. Modifications to tires are allowed. This includes rubber tires, screws in tires, etc.
- 11. All Power Wheels must have a number so they can be recognized by the announcer in the tower. You may use paint, stickers, or a small sign to do this. Decorating is encouraged as we will have a crowd's choice award.
- 12. Do not add something to the Power Wheels vehicle that could cause the child to not be allowed in the derby. Remember that THIS IS FOR KIDS. You would have a disappointed child on your hands if they aren't allowed to run.
- All Power Wheels vehicles will be checked in and then impounded until time for their event.

- 14. One parent MUST accompany the child to the pit area. One parent may be allowed on the track with the child during the event.
- 15. Each heat will be given a time limit.
- If a child gets out of the Power Wheels vehicle during the event, that child is disqualified.
- 17. If officials feel that a vehicle is unsafe or does not fit in the rule set, the entry will be loaded. The officials have the final say.

PARENTS: Please don't forget that this is for fun. This is a great way to teach your child good sportsmanship. Although we will have trophies this year, we want the kids to have fun and get used to being on a track so they can keep derbies alive when they grow up. After all, they are the future of this sport.

General Rules and Regulations

- Exhibitors must comply with the General rules and regulations found on page 15 and the State of Maryland Health Regulations found on page 24.
- Exhibits in adult/open livestock classes are limited to Garrett County residents.
- Livestock registration will be Sunday, July 20, 2023 unless otherwise noted. Animals will be released at 11:00 pm, Saturday, August 5, 2023 or any time Sunday.
- 4. All animals arriving on the Fairgrounds must use the Main entrance off Mosser Road. Animals may be unloaded in the barn areas only. Unloading of animals between the barn area and the main exhibit barn and fair office area will not be permitted. All exhibitors will be expected to take their livestock trucks and trailers home and not park them on the fairgrounds during Fair Week. Trailers left on the Fair Grounds will need to pay \$100.00 for a trailer-parking permit.
- No animals will be permitted, at anytime, outside the livestock barn area.
- 6. No tack boxes will be allowed in the swine or sheep barns. Tack boxes in the beef and dairy barns must remain in line with curbs and may not sit in aisles. Only one tack box per family is allowed. Beef trimming/blocking chutes may only be used in designated areas. All chutes must be removed from the area outside the show ring 15 minutes before each show. Tents and generators are not permitted in any area of the Fairgrounds.
- 7. All breeding animals exhibited must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor by June 1 (unless otherwise noted). Animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor. Animals must be registered with the appropriate Breed Association, unless otherwise noted, and will be checked by the Superintendent.
- All livestock shall be cared for by the exhibitor or whomever they designate to do so. They will be solely responsible for the care of their animals and stalls and showing of the same.
- The exhibitor must furnish feed.
- 10. All animal entries must be filed in advance with the appropriate department superintendent. Superintendents will assign stall spaces, and animals must remain in the assigned space unless approved by the Superintendent.
- Classes are limited. Please consult each section for the number of animals accepted per

- exhibitor.
- Any entry in the 4-H/FFA classes is not eligible to compete in open classes, but youth may enter other animals. Youth too young for or not in 4-H/FFA may enter in the open class.
- 13. The Fair Board requires all exhibitors to have their stall area, barns and general areas in a neat and orderly manner at all times. Failure to do so will result in forfeiture of premiums. All animals must be fed and washed, and all stalls and barn areas cleaned by 12 noon, except show day. Please observe the 11:00pm to 6:00pm curfew of not feeding or disturbing animals. All small animal pens must be cleaned out to the ground by Friday at noon. New shavings will be issued.
- 14. The superintendent will collect five dollars (\$5.00) per head (except horses) for beef, goats, sheep, and swine at the time of entry for cleaning of stalls at the end of the Fair. Bedding will be provided if available by the Garrett County Fair Board.
- No selling of poultry or rabbits.
- 16. All complaints must be submitted in writing to the Fair Board Office. The Official Form to be used may be picked up in the Fair office. NO complaint will be addressed unless it is submitted to the Fair Office in writing.
- 17. If the animal is uncontrollable, unsafe or in an undesirable condition, it may be removed from the fairgrounds at the request of the Livestock Advisory Committee. The Livestock Advisory Committee will consist of Deb Barnard, Jason VanSickle, Justin Gregory, Lisa Brenneman, Mark Rodeheaver, Vernon Paugh, Sam Wright, Gary Mason, Extension Educators, Northern and Southern FFA Advisors and a veterinarian (when needed).

- 6. This department is open to anyone who makes less than 25% of his/her livelihood through the sale of photography. While no specific guidelines define "semi-professional", the intent is for entrants to select these sections who have won top awards in the past, have more training and experience, or use more advanced photography equipment. General Rules and Regulations

- Classes are open to currently enrolled Garrett County 4-H and FFA Club members.
- Exhibitors must be enrolled in 4-H work on or before June 1, of current year. (Youth must be 8 years of age by January 1.)

Age divisions (By Jan 1, of current year): Junior, 8-10 Intermediate, 11-13 Senior, 14-18

(Includes youth with disabilities beyond age 18 if enrolled in a high school program.)

- If you have a disability or a special need that requires special assistance for your participation in the Garrett County Fair, please contact the Garrett County Extension Office at 301-334-6960.
- 4. FFA members must be a dues paying member of that organization.
- Exhibitors must comply with the General rules and regulations found on page 15 and the State of Maryland Health Regulations found on page 24.
- 6. Exhibitors must comply with the Maryland 4-H/FFA Code of Ethics. The 4-H/FFA Code of Ethics applies to all individuals exhibiting Beef Cattle, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goats, Meat Goats, Horses, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, and Swine and other livestock projects at the Garrett County Fair. Exhibitors of Market Animals must also comply with the Garrett County Livestock Association's Rules and Regulations with regard to selling their animal.
- Exhibitors who do not obey rules and/ or behavior expectation standards of the Maryland 4-H and FFA programs will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action as established in the Code of conduct in effect for each organization.
- Each 4-H and FFA member must have completed the Livestock Quality Assurance Training to exhibit and sell an animal. Must also meet attendance requirements as listed in Garrett County Livestock Association Contract.
- 9. Market animal entries will be received Sunday, from 9:00am to 4:00pm. All market animals must be on the grounds by 4:00pm Sunday. Health Certificates with completed self certification and registration papers will be checked during these hours. Animal health and condition will be checked by veterinarian Sunday after 4pm. No blankets, tubes or

- coverings may be placed on animals until this walk thru is completed. Breeding animals (except dairy) will also be entered on Sunday.
- 10. Ànimals will be released at 11:00pm, Saturday, August 5, 2023.
- 11. All animals arriving on the Fairgrounds must use the entrance off Mosser Road. Animals may be unloaded in the barn areas only. Unloading of animals between the barn area and the main exhibit barn and fair office area will not be permitted. All exhibitors will be expected to take their livestock trucks and trailers home and not park them on the fairgrounds during Fair Week. Trailers left on the Fairgrounds will need to pay \$100.00 for a trailer-parking permit.
- No animals will be permitted, at anytime, outside the livestock barn area.
- 13. NO tack boxes will be allowed in the swine or sheep barns. Tack boxes in the beef and dairy barns must remain in line with curbs and may not sit in aisles. Only one tack box per family is allowed. Beef trimming/blocking chutes may only be used in designated areas. All chutes must be removed from the area outside the show ring 15 minutes before each show. Tents, canopies and/or generators are not allowed anywhere on the Fairgrounds.
- 14. All registered animals exhibited must be bona fide property of the exhibitor. Animals must be registered with the appropriate Breed Association, in the name of the exhibitor. Registration papers will be checked by the Superintendent. All market animals (with the exception of Market Steers) and commercial beef breeding heifers must be tagged at the spring weigh in. Market Steers must be tagged at the previous fall weigh in.
- 15. All livestock shall be cared for by the exhibitor or whomever they designate to do so. They will be solely responsible for the care of their animals and stalls and showing of the same. In the case of illness or emergency, the exhibitor or parent must report to the appropriate show superintendent. If a substitute showman is approved, he or she must be a 4-H or FFA member of the same chronological age or younger than the exhibitor he/she is replacing or may be a member of the ill or injured child's immediate family. Parents and spectators are not permitted in the show ring during a show. Interference with the show or judging may result in disqualification or removal. There will be adults assigned to the show ring to assist youth.
- The exhibitor must furnish feed.
- 17. Any medical issues of exhibited animals will be the responsibility of the exhibitor and families should call their regular veterinarian to arrange for advice or care.
- 18. All animal entries must be filed in advance with the appropriate department superintendent.





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Superintendents will assign stall spaces, and animals must remain in the assigned space unless approved by the Superintendent. (All 4-H and FFA market animals need not register for a stall space. Information will be provided to the Superintendent by the 4-H program.)

- All 4-H and FFA market animals must have been ear tagged as project animals according to the Garrett Livestock Association guidelines.
- 20. Market animals will be weighed in on Sunday, from 9:00am to 4:00pm. No Market Animal may be re-weighed. Sheep, goats, and swine will be weighed as removed from trucks. Steers will be weighted on scales located at entrance to Steer Barn.
- 21. Market animals (beef, sheep, hog, goat) which are over or under the listed weight range MAY be allowed to stay on the fairgrounds, if space is available. Over or underweight animals may be shown in the Showmanship for that species. Over and underweight animals will be judged in separate market classes and will not be eligible for championships, county bred championships or the livestock sale. Under and overweight animals will not be eligible for rate of gain award.
- Members are permitted to exhibit two (2) entries per class; except, one animal in market classes, rabbits, and poultry and elsewhere as noted.
- Any animal in beef, sheep, swine, dairy goat, meat goat and dairy, shown but not receiving any premium will be awarded a \$5.00 premium.
- 24. Any entry in the 4-H/FFA classes is not eligible to compete in open classes, but youth may enter other animals.
- 25. The Fair Board requires all exhibitors to have their stall area, barns and general areas in a neat and orderly manner at all times. Failure to do so will result in forfeiture of premiums. All animals must be fed and washed, and all stalls and barn areas cleaned by 12 noon, except show day. Please observe the 11:00pm to 6:00am curfew of not feeding or disturbing animals. All small animal pens must be cleaned out to the ground by Friday at noon. New shavings will be issued.
- 26. The superintendent will collect five dollars (\$5.00) per head for sheep, goats, beef, and swine at the time of entry for cleaning of stalls at the end of the Fair.
- 27. If an animal is uncontrollable, unsafe or in an undesirable condition, it may be removed from the fairgrounds at the request of the Livestock Advisory Committee. The Livestock Advisory Committee will consist of Deb Barnard, Jason Vansickle, Justin Gregory, Lisa Brenneman, Mark Rodeheaver, Vernon Paugh, Sam Wright, Gary Mason, Extension Educators, Northern and Southern FFA Advisors and a

- veterinarian (when needed).
- 28. All complaints must be submitted in writing to the Fair Board Office. The Official Form to be used may be picked up in the Fair office. NO complaint will be addressed unless it is submitted to the Fair Office in writing.
- 29. The Garrett County Livestock Association will not be responsible for non-market animals left at the fairgrounds after Saturday, August 5, 2023. Any animal still remaining on the fairgrounds Monday morning at 9 am, following the Fair will become property of the Garrett County Fair and will be taken to the stockyard.
- 30. A member may show a leased animal as long they do not raise the same species where they live. Leasing is intended to provide an opportunity to a youth that would otherwise not be able to participate in that project. Lease papers must be on file at the Extension Office by June 1st, of current year.

Maryland 4-H/FFA Code of Animal Science Ethics

4-H/FFA members enrolled in animal science projects (e.g., beef, camelids, dairy, dog, goat, horse, poultry, rabbit, sheep, small pet, and swine) shall, at all times, conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship, including while with their projects and at all 4-H/FFA animal science activities and events. Their conduct should always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of 4-H/FFA and its animal science program. 4-H/FFA members, as well as parents, UME volunteers and others working with them, are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts; and their conduct and values must serve as a positive influence on

This Code of Ethics applies to all 4-H/FFA members who are enrolled in animal science projects, and to others (4-H/FFAers, parents, volunteers, owners, etc.) who participate in the animal science program; and it covers daily animal care, as well as participation in competition and other 4-H/FFA animal activities and events.

4-H/FFA members and others who violate this Code of Ethics demean the integrity of 4-H/FFA and its animal science program. 4-H/FFA members who violate the code of animal science ethics are subject to sanctions including, but not limited to, forfeiture of premiums, awards, and/or auction proceeds and may be prohibited from participation in 4-H/FFA or 4-H/FFA/UME events or activities; other violators may also be subject to sanction, as appropriate. Infractions may be reviewed by 4-H/FFA and/or UME (on the local or state level, as

appropriate to the infraction and to the event and/or activity in question), and/or may be subject to a fair oversight committee or other entity that oversees an activity or event. In addition, some acts may also be subject to review based upon the 4-H/FFA Behavioral Expectations (4-H/FFA 418) and/or other UME policies.

The following is a list of standards and requirements for all 4-H/FFA animal science projects, at all times, whether at home, at animal exhibitions or events, or any other 4-H/FFA event or activity.

- The care of all 4-H/FFA project animals is the responsibility of the 4-H/FFA member. 4-H/ FFA members must properly care for and groom their animals for the duration of their project.
- All project animals are expected to be housed at the 4-H/FFA member's residence unless a different location is submitted to and approved in writing by the local 4-H/FFA staff.
 Any change in location must be approved in writing by the local 4-H/FFA staff; however, it is not necessary to report direct transport to and from shows or other events.
- 3. Upon request of 4-H/FFA, UME, or other program, fair, event or animal officials, 4-H/FFA members must present proof of ownership, length of ownership, identity and/ or age of all 4-H/FFA project animals owned or leased. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or identity of animal, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited. If a 4-H/FFA project animal is sold in a livestock sale, it is no longer eligible to be shown in a 4-H/FFA event in Maryland in that year.
- 4-H/FFA members must provide appropriate animal health certificates upon request of 4-H/ FFA, UME, or other program, fair, event or animal officials.
- 5. 4-H/FFA project animals must be presented to competition, activities and/or events, where they will enter the food chain, free of volatile drug residues. Animals which are presented to competition, events and/or activities that do not culminate with the animal entering the food chain, shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations 4-H/FFA project animals shall and rules. not be exhibited if drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and local regulations and rules may affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. At any time after an animal arrives on a fair or other 4-H/FFA activity or event premises, a licensed veterinarian must administer or, in consultation with fair, event, UME, or 4-H/ FFA officials, direct the administration of any treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications.

- 6. The act of enrolling in a 4-H/FFA animal science project, and/or entering a project animal in a 4-H/FFA competition, show, activity, or other event, gives consent for 4-H/ FFA or UME or event authorities to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, hair, tissue, or other substance from the animal to be used for testing purposes including, but not limited to, drugs or identification. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood or other substance tested by the approved laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved, and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the 4-H/FFA owner to prove otherwise at any review in regard to the matter conducted by a fair or other event or the 4-H/FFA program. If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, hair, tissue or other sample, taken from a 4-H/FFA animal science project, indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally.
- 7. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counter irritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- Any market animal found to have one or more testicles (no matter what size or condition) must be removed from the Fairgrounds. All castrations must be completely healed.
- Using ice, ice packs, cold packs, or cold compresses, internally or externally, other than those prescribed to relieve heat stress or a medical condition as diagnosed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices, such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical devices, or other similar practices, are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- All judges, fair and event officials and/or UME/4-H/FFA staff and volunteers shall





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be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect, and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them or toward exhibitors or others participating in the activity. In addition, direct criticism or interference with a judge, fair, show or event official, exhibitor, breed representative, or UME/4-H/FFA staff or volunteer before, during, or after an event or other activity is prohibited.

- 12. No one shall violate this Code of Animal Science Ethics or conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this Code of Ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this Code of Ethics.
- 13. The application of this Code of Ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition to the 4-H/FFA member whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this Code of Ethics.
- By enrolling in an animal science project and/ or entering an animal in a fair or other 4-H/ FFA event or activity, the 4-H/FFA member. and his/her parent or guardian, consent to have disciplinary action taken by appropriate authorities (including UME, 4-H/FFA, fair, event and/or other activity officials) for violation of this Code of Animal Science Ethics and/or any other applicable rules of UME. 4-H/FFA, a fair, activity or other event, without recourse against UME, 4-H/FFA and/ or other authorities. In addition, the 4-H/FFA member, and his/her parent or guardian, further understand and agree that any action which contravenes these rules, and is also in violation of federal, state, or local laws, statutes, regulations, or rules, may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Showmanship

- All showmanship classes are for ribbons only. Exhibitors must own animals they are showing.
- 2. The fitting and preparation of all animals for show is the responsibility of the exhibitors. Exhibitors may receive guidance from immediate family members, other Maryland 4-H/FFA youth and county adult leaders. Violations of this policy could result in immediate disqualification of the exhibitor from all 4-H and FFA livestock shows and competitions at the Garrett County Fair and Maryland State Fair and dismissal from the grounds. The Livestock Advisory Committee will handle violations of this policy.

4-H and FFA members must wear the prescribed attire when participating in showmanship, breeding, and market classes, pictures and sales.

FFA members exhibiting will need to follow FFA official dress requirements for showing livestock (white collared shirt, neck tie/scarf, black pants and jacket). Students who have been chapter officers have the option of wearing official officer polos and khakis.

Livestock (Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goat, Rabbit, Dog)

- Proper show attire is required for all showmanship, breeding, markets shows, pictures and the livestock sale.
- Black, khaki, or dark-color slacks/jeans are required. Girls may substitute dark-color or khaki-colored skirts.
- 3. White or dressy shirts with sleeves and a collar are required.
- 4. No hats may be worn in the show/sale ring.
- Appropriate neckpieces may be worn.
- Unacceptable attire includes T-shirts, shirts with inappropriate logos (such as advertising for alcohol, tobacco or farm names), faded or dirty jeans, and jeans with holes.
- Safe, appropriate attire, including footwear, is required at all times. No sandals or lightweight tennis shoes. Good work shoes or boots are best.
- Proper show items for your animal are required. Example: Swine - hog cane or flapper and a brush: Beef - show stick, comb and show halter.

Dairy and Dairy Goats

- White or khaki slacks, girls may wear knee length skirt, with white shirt; optional neckpiece
- 2. No prong or pinch collars will be allowed when showing any 4H goat.

Horse and Pony

 Appropriate riding clothes and head gear for the division.

Dairy Goats, Market Goats and any Breeding Goats

 No prong or pinch collars will be allowed when showing any 4H goat.

All exhibitors are expected to be neat and presentable at all times.



Embryo transplanted animals will be considered county bred when the breeder owns both the donor dam and the recipient dam, offspring are born in Garrett County and the breeder is a full time resident of Garrett County. All county-bred animals must be identified as such at the initial weigh-in and tagging for the species. At weigh-in and tagging, the exhibitor must note the name of the county producer from whom the animal was purchased, and the producer must sign the attestation statement on the card used to record the animal's information at weigh-in and tagging. Animals may not be designated as county bred animals after the initial weigh-in and tagging date.

Animals eligible for participation in the County
Bred Competition will be identified during the
regular market show for the particular species.
The top two placing county bred animals in
each class will be identified during the market
show for possible participation in the county
bred competition which will be held following
the naming of the overall Grand Champion and
Reserve Grand Champion of the species.
 A county-bred champion and county-bred

reserve champion will be identified in each

weight division. When a division champion in the market show is also a county bred animal that entry will automatically be the county bred division champion and will represent that entire division in the Grand Champion County Bred Champion competition. If the division champion is not a county bred animal, but the division reserve champion is a county bred animal, the entry will automatically be the county bred champion in that weight division. The county bred division reserve champion will then be selected from among the highest placing animal from each class within the division. The County Bred Division Champion will be selected from among the three County Bred Division Champions. The Reserve County Bred Champion of the division from which the Grand Champion Country Bred animal is selected will then compete for Reserve Grand Champion county Bred animal.

Section 10 Showmanship

Rules and Regulations

- 1. Exhibitors must be 4-H/FFA Club members and must comply with all general rules and regulations and the requirements of the Maryland 4-H Horse and Pony Show Rule Book - (4-H 266). Horse Registration Card must be on file by May 1.
- Exhibitor must wear approved headgear and footwear when mounted at any time while at fair, including schooling.
- An animal can only be shown once for prize
- 4. The following rules apply to all halter classes at the Garrett County Fair, both 4-H and adult classes for Ponies and Riding Horses. All ponies must be measured by Superintendent.
- Animals must compete for champion honors.
- 6. Horses, ponies and donkeys must be tested

- for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) within 12 months of fair. The Certificate showing the Coggins test negative must accompany horses and ponies and be shown to superintendent before unloading.
- 7. All stall reservation forms must be in by first Monday in July to Superintendents. Forms include age, sex, breed and copy of Coggins number.
- 8. An animal (equine) may be exhibited in one of the halter divisions and grooming and showmanship.

Small Pony: under 12.2 hands

Medium Pony: from 12.2 to under 13.2 hands Large Pony: from 13.2 to under 14.2 hands

Donkey: A male donkey is called a jack, a female a jenny or jennet

This gives a high probability that the lamb's tail will measure at least 0.7 inches at the time of show. 4-Hers should use the DeTail device to select lambs that have been properly docked. Compliance with the Maryland 4-H Tail docking Policy will be VOLUNTARY. Lamb tails (docks) will not be officially measured at Maryland 4-H activities. No lambs will be disqualified from showing due to tail length, unless the short dock results in a rectal prolapse. Any sheep or lamb that exhibits a rectal prolapse at a 4-H

activity will be ineligible for the activity and sent home by the Sheep Superintendent, Extension Educator or other appropriately deemed individual. The following will be used as a guideline to determine occurrence of a rectal prolapse:

Required compliance: "Any sheep or lamb that exhibits a rectal prolapse at a 4-H activity will be ineligible for that show and be sent home by Extension Educator, Sheep Superintendent, or other appropriately deemed individual. Lambs with purse-string sutures are ineligible for exhibition at 4-H Show." The following will be used as guideline for making this determination: "A rectal prolapse is defined as an inversion of the rectum that protrudes 4 cm (1.6 in.) or more outside the body and remains exterior to the body while the animal is standing." (Journal of Animal Science 2003, Thomas et al.) If a lamb is observed with rectal prolapse (by one of the above people) and in the future is not observed with a rectal prolapse, it is still classified as having a rectal prolapse.
