Garrett County Agriculture Fair Early History

The very first Garrett County Fair was held in 1917 in the Naylor Building on Third Street in Oakland, and the lot between that building and Center Street. Later, sheds were constructed near Center Street on the Sweeney lot to house part of the exhibits, and successful fairs were held at this location until the early twenties. As interest in the Fair increased, it became necessary to have more space, so the Bradley property west of Oakland was purchased. Some of the exhibits were housed in the Bradley house. A shed was erected for the livestock and poultry entries. The last of the fairs held at the Bradley farm location was in 1931.

Most of the earlier Garrett County fairs were held in late September, because more farm products were available for showing at that time of the year. However, many people who had experience with these fairs said that attendance and general support were in direct relation to the weather, and the weather here in late September is often less than ideal for going to the fair. Several years of bad weather during fair week resulted in financial losses and the Fifteenth Annual Garrett County Fair, September 15, 16,

17 and 18, 1932, was the last until 1957.

Meetings were held early in 1954 to again organize a Garrett County Fair. H.G. Gortner, Allen S. Paugh, Sr. Walter DeBerry, Baity Ridder, and then County Extension Agent, John Carter, were among those instrumental in working out details for the first Garrett County Agriculture Fair, Inc. held August 13-17, 1957, on the property of Charles H. Bowman, near Deep Creek, McHenry, Maryland, where the present Fair is held.

Officers elected were H.G. Gortner, President; John J. Brennehan, Vice President; Charles A. Wilt, Secretary; Allen S. Paugh, Sr., Treasurer; and Claude W. Wagner, Sr., Manager. The Board of Directors was composed of sixteen men and four women to serve for four-year terms.

The property had one Quonset hut for the first fair. Other tents and temporary buildings were used to house the exhibits and animals. Many improvements have been made to the fair grounds through the years. Today Garrett County Fair stands as one of the true remaining agriculturally based fairs in the state.

Rules and Regulations

1. Exhibitors that violate any rule(s) of the Garrett County Fair may be subject to a forfeiture of premiums.
2. The Executive Committee reserves the right to interpret these rules and regulations and will settle all questions and differences that may arise in matters concerning the general exhibits and shows. Issues pertaining to Livestock will be referred to the Livestock Advisory Committee.

Online entry is available for all 4-H and open exhibitor categories. This can be found online on the fair website, along with deadlines to register. Online entry is optional for all categories except 4-H Livestock. Subject to change. See below.

LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS Online entry will be mandatory for all 4-H/FFA livestock exhibitors.

As mentioned above, online registration will be available starting June 5th unless otherwise communicated by means listed above. We are encouraging all 4-H members to also register any indoor exhibits with their livestock entries. While not mandatory, registering all entries online will save time on registration day.

STALL REGISTRATION IS STILL REQUIRED TO BE SENT TO SUPERINTENDENTS BY JULY 1ST. PLEASE USE FORM FOUND IN BACK OF PREMIUM BOOK TO SAVE YOUR STALL SPACE.

In person registration will remain available for all OPEN exhibitor classes (including open livestock) and 4-H/FFA indoor exhibitor classes on the 1st Saturday of the fair week from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m.

After doing online registration, please print

out your exhibitors entries. If printing out is not an option, exhibitors will need to fill out entry form(s) found in the back of the book. Please refer to www.garrettcountyfair.org, the Garrett County Extension Office (301-334-6960), or the fair computer office for forms. The entry process is as follows:

- a. Report to the computer office with the completed list of entries. You do not need to bring your entries.
- b. Obtain an exhibitor number from the staff.
- c. Take your completed list, exhibitor number and your entries to the appropriate section superintendent(s).
- d. When you have finished entering all of your exhibits, **return** your list to the computer office.

4. Entries in the Garrett County Fair and eligibility for premiums is limited to Garrett County residents and non-resident taxpayers, except where otherwise noted.
5. All premium checks need to be cashed within 60 days from the date of issue to settle any disputes.
6. Pets, other than those for participation in the pet show, and special needs dogs, are not allowed on the Fairgrounds.
7. Possession or consumption of alcohol or drugs will not be permitted on the Fairgrounds. This includes visitors and exhibitors. Violations of this rule will result in forfeiture of premiums and expulsion from the Fairgrounds.
8. Smoking in any building on the Fairgrounds is prohibited.
9. The management of the Garrett County Fair will not be responsible for unsupervised youth that stay on the grounds. Any misconduct may result in expulsion from the Fairgrounds.
10. There is to be no sleeping in the barns between the hours of 11 p.m. and 6 a.m. All youth must be under adult supervision during these hours.
11. No unauthorized golf carts or 4-wheelers including ATVs and hoverboards.

Special Regulations

- All persons enter at their own risk.

- Parents/Guardians are responsible for the supervision of all minors.
- Not responsible for lost articles.
- No alcoholic beverages, controlled substances or cannabis allowed.
- No illegal or unlawful activity allowed.
- No unauthorized demonstrations.
- No soliciting.
- No distribution of any printed material/flyers/ advertisements, etc. except from designated commercial exhibits.
- No pets permitted on fairgrounds except Service Animals and animals being exhibited.
- All motorized vehicles (golf carts, gators, ATV's) and operators must be authorized by the Garrett County Fair Board, and operator must have a valid driver's license.
- Our insurance coverage requires all drivers in events during the Fair to be at least 16 years of age. Any driver between 16-18 must have a parent/guardian permission form signed prior to each event. This includes tractor pulls, truck pulls, drag races, mud bogs, and demolition derbies. For the antique tractor pull and parade only, those under 16 are permitted to drive with parent/guardian signed consent. Permission forms available at the Fair Office.
- The Garrett County Fair Board (the "Board") reserves the right to exclude from the Fairgrounds any person (exhibitor, spectator, parent of exhibitor, vendor, and admission-paying patron) who is in any manner disruptive or who exhibits inappropriate behavior that would disrupt the public. Such behavior shall include, but not be limited to, any public cursing, abusive or belligerent language, or any language, clothing or conduct which causes others to feel threatened at any time with respect to any activity conducted on the Fairgrounds. The Board may delegate such authority to impose any such sanction to its President or any officer of the Board or the Board's General Manager. Said sanction shall also include the right to temporarily or permanently ban participation in future events, whether or not they are sanctioned by the Board, or any third-party exhibitors or vendors, specifically, the Board may prohibit participation by individual persons who violate this policy from participating in

Board-sanctioned exhibitions, classes or shows. In the event a person who has paid admission to the fairgrounds is asked to leave the premises, such admission shall be refunded upon that person leaving the premises.

- **No Selfie Sticks or Drones allowed at anytime. No Hover Boards or Skateboards Any banned item will be confiscated and NOT returned.**
- No blankets or chairs may not be placed on show ring bleachers until one hour prior to show. Blankets and chairs will be removed every evening at the completion of each event. Any remaining will be removed by fair directors or designee.

ALL VIOLATORS WILL BE IMMEDIATELY ESCORTED FROM THE PREMISES.

Exhibits

1. Exhibits may be entered in the Garrett County Fair free of charge unless otherwise noted.
2. All animals must be exhibited in the name of the owner; all products of the soil in the name of the producer; and articles of craftsmanship must be the handiwork of the exhibitor.
3. An exhibitor may not enter the same item in more than one department nor any item exhibited in an open class be used as part of a group exhibit. (does not apply to livestock).
4. Articles exhibited in the Garrett County Fair in previous years are barred from competition. (This does not apply to Livestock.)
5. **All Indoor Exhibits must be entered on Saturday, August 1, 2026 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.**
6. Indoor exhibits cannot be removed from the Fairgrounds until **Sunday, August 9, 2026.** All Exhibits must be picked up between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. Items not picked up become the property of Garrett County Agriculture Fair. Garrett County Fair is not responsible for any exhibits not picked up or left after these times.
7. Premium checks will be issued on Saturday, August 8, in the computer office. An

announcement will be made when they are available. Checks not picked up on Saturday will be mailed.

8. The Management of the Garrett County Fair will take every precaution to secure all entries at the Fair, but will not be responsible for damages or loss that may occur.
9. In addition to these rules each exhibitor and entry is subject to each section and division rules.

Judging

1. Competent Judges are secured. Judges will make their decisions in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Garrett County Fair.
2. No one is allowed to serve as a judge of any class in which they exhibit. Departmental Superintendents may exhibit in their own departments.
3. Judges may remove from competition any exhibitor attempting to interfere during judging.
4. No premiums are awarded for Champion, Honorable Mention or Participation ribbons

2026 MARYLAND ANIMAL HEALTH FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS

Effective: February 1, 2026

The Maryland Department of Agriculture (MDA) Animal Health Program strives to safeguard Maryland's animal industries at our fairs and shows. With an increased potential of disease transmission occurring when large numbers of animals gather for exhibition, MDA has set forth requirements for exhibitors to follow at Maryland fairs and shows. As an exhibitor, you can help reduce the potential risk of introduction and spread of infectious and/or contagious diseases by following the species-specific health requirements below. Fairs may impose more stringent rules than the requirements in this document at their own discretion. All exhibitors are encouraged to check with the management of each fair in advance to ensure compliance with all fair requirements. These requirements and recommendations are a shared responsibility of show management and exhibitors to protect public and animal health in the state. Exhibitors and exhibition managers are expected to comply with all applicable Maryland laws. These requirements are subject to change. For the most up to date requirements please refer to our website.

NOTABLE 2026 ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS:

1. CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (CVI):
 - a. Maryland CVI's are now valid for ONLY 60 days (NOT 120 days).
 - b. Online CVIs have always been accepted and are strongly recommended. Veterinarians are encouraged to use electronic CVI's. Owners are required to produce a copy (digital or printed).
 - c. Starting in 2026, there is a fee for paper CVI's (\$3/certificate). They will be distributed in packs of 25 (\$75/pack) with a shipping fee of \$25. We will NOT be printing more CVI's, therefore once our inventory is out, you will be required to use an electronic CVI.
- d. Equids will be required to have either a CVI or verification of a veterinary-client-patient-relationship (VCPR).
- e. It is strongly recommended that all rabbits be accompanied by a CVI.
2. EXHIBITOR RECOMMENDATIONS
 - a. All animals that originate from a location other than Maryland shall meet all Maryland State importation regulations appropriate to the species in addition to the fair animal health requirements.
 - b. It is strongly recommended that animals returning home from exhibitions be isolated from other members of the herd or flock for a minimum of 14 days to help prevent the spread of disease. We recommend that exhibitors of all animals discuss the health of their animals, including vaccine recommendations and other preventative measures, with a veterinarian on a regular basis. Owners and their veterinarians should carefully check and comply with additional requirements specific to each exhibition prior to the exhibition to ensure eligibility.
3. EXHIBITION BIOSECURITY AND SPACE REQUIREMENTS
 - a. Note the recommendations for poultry, rabbits, and commercial animal exhibits in their designated sections.
 - b. An exhibition facility and its associated buildings shall be cleaned and disinfected with a State Veterinarian-approved disinfectant and used in

accordance with label instructions before animals are admitted and between groups of animals when housing is rotated.

i. Approved Disinfectants: follow label directions for use of any disinfectant, if not specified below.

1. Accelerated Hydrogen Peroxides (Accel,[®] Intervention[®], or Rescue[®])

2. Bleach (such as Clorox[®]) at a ratio of 1:32, which is ½ cup (4 oz.) to 1 gallon of water. Do not add ammonia to bleach/water mixture.

3. Phenolic disinfectants (like Pinesol [®]) for poultry equipment and pens

4. Virkon-S[®]

4. RESPONSIBLE PERSON ACKNOWLEDGEMENT FORM

a. All responsible persons or superintendents at exhibitions will be required to fill out an acknowledgement form of exhibition requirements and biosecurity best practices.

b. This form is available on MDA's website and should be returned to our office at least 30 days prior to the event.

5. MARYLAND POULTRY:

a. For avian influenza testing, a representative sample of 10 BIRDS PER PREMISES must be tested within 21 days of the event start date, regardless of National Poultry Improvement Program (NPIP) status.

i. If there are less than 10 birds, then all birds must be tested.

ii. Owners are required to produce a copy of the test results (digital or printed).

b. Meat birds are required to be tested for AI.

c. Meat bird projects, properly identified with a leg/wing band, do not need to be PT tested but must be separated from other untested birds on the premises.

6. MARYLAND EQUIDS:

a. Maryland equids must have verification of a veterinary-client-patient relationship (VCPR). This can be either a current CVI or EECVI (recommended), however,

a completed VCPR form is acceptable. Owners are required to produce a copy (digital or printed). Please visit our website for the VCPR form.

b. It is the responsibility of the horse owner to be aware of any changes to health and travel requirements during disease outbreaks that may be posted to our website. Consult with your veterinarian to understand the risks associated with travel to equine events.

c. An Equine Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health is required for each equine entering a fair/show-type event where multiple livestock species are present.

The form must be available for inspection if requested (digital or printed). Those participating in equine-only shows and events are exempt from this requirement.

d. INSTRUCTIONS TO EQUINE EVENT MANAGERS

i. An equine event is any organized equine show, sale/auction, exhibition, contest, fair, trail ride, parade, wagon train, charity or social event, or any other occurrence at which any number of horses of more than one (1) owner are gathered.

1. Proof of a valid negative Coggin's is required for ALL events except sales and auctions in which all horses will be tested for equine infectious anemia.

2. Maryland equids must have verification of a veterinary-client-patient relationship (VCPR). This can be either a current CVI or EECVI (recommended), however, a completed VCPR form is acceptable.

ii. MDA Animal Health will contact equine event managers after receiving a copy of their notification form for exhibition to ensure that all participating horses have a valid negative Coggins.

iii. A valid test is one which has a negative result from blood drawn less than one (1) year from the event date and matches the horse

presented. One person should be designated by the organization to serve as the equine event manager. Additionally, the event manager is subject to notification prior to the event to provide the Equine Event Report or a similar report, that each horse at the event has a valid negative Coggin's test. iv. COMAR 15.11.12.03 states that:

1. All equines over 9 months old assembled for supervised exhibition in the State shall have been found negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia made within 12 months before the date of the event. The supervisor of the event shall ascertain that a copy of the official negative test results accompanies each equine to the event and shall make a list of the entries and their test status available for inspection by a representative of the Secretary upon request.

7. DEFINITIONS:

a. PETTING ZOO

i. An exhibition where the public is encouraged to touch/interact with any livestock or other animals.

ii. This can include but is not limited to pony rides and fair and show petting zoos.

b. COMMERCIAL ANIMAL EXHIBIT

i. A public display of animals for profit, which can include goat yoga, cow cuddling, piglet snuggling, rent-a-chick etc.

1. These exhibits are subject to regulations, such as those under the Animal Welfare Act, which mandate minimum standards of care for animals that are exhibited.

2. Exhibitors must have a valid commercial animal exhibit registration through the Maryland Department of Agriculture. The form is available on MDA's website.

c. EDUCATIONAL ANIMAL EXHIBIT

i. Breed displays, birthing centers and other displays/exhibits where the public is not permitted to touch the animals.

MARYLAND LAW PROVIDES PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS OF ANIMAL HEALTH LAW AND REGULATIONS. LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY FAILING TO MEET COMPLETE DOCUMENTATION OF ALL REQUIREMENTS WILL BE DENIED ENTRY OR REMOVED FROM THE EXHIBITION - "REJECTED." SEE ANIMAL REJECTION POLICY UNDER GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITORS.

REQUIREMENTS FOR SPONSORS OF A LIVESTOCK/POULTRY EXHIBITION (COMAR 15.11.14.05)

1. NOTIFICATION: Exhibit sponsors must notify the Maryland Department of Agriculture (MDA), of intent to sponsor an event that includes the exhibition of livestock or poultry no less than 30 days before the proposed event. Please fill out all contact information correctly, to include a phone number and email address. Animal arrival times MUST be provided to ensure coverage for entry. Please call 410.841.5810 to request a NOTIFICATION FORM or go to MDA's website.
2. RESPONSIBLE PERSON ACKNOWLEDGEMENT FORM: All responsible persons or superintendents at exhibitions will be required to fill out an acknowledgement form of exhibition requirements and biosecurity best practices. This form is available on MDA's website and should be returned to our office at least 30 days prior to the event.
3. REPORTING: Sponsors must report to MDA, within 24 hours, any animal from the exhibition suspected of having or showing obvious, apparent, or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease and/or deaths; and exclude from the exhibition premises any animals having obvious, apparent, or known signs of a contagious or

infectious disease. A summary of all disease events shall be provided to MDA, in the form of an animal incident report. Call 410.841.5810 to request an ANIMAL INCIDENT REPORT FORM or go to MDA's website.

4. RECORDS: Exhibit sponsors must maintain a report of the owner, premises location, and species of all animals attending the exhibition and provide this report to MDA if requested.
5. EXEMPTIONS: Exemptions of this regulation may be granted. (Refer to COMAR 15.11.14.05)

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITORS OF ALL ANIMAL SPECIES

(COMAR 15.11.14.04-06)

- Exhibitors at state, county, and district fairs, along with other livestock exhibitions, expositions, rodeos, shows, and swap meets are required to comply with regulatory provisions of the State of Maryland relating to animal health as noted in COMAR 15.11.14.04-06.
- Requirements apply to all livestock and poultry: Livestock is defined as those species of animals used for human food or fiber or those species of animals used for service to humans. This includes but is not limited to cattle, bison, sheep, goats, swine, equine, New World camelids (llamas & alpacas), privately owned cervids, and rabbits. Livestock does not include dogs, cats, and exotic pets. Poultry is defined as any living domestic bird raised for food or other purposes including, but not limited to, chickens, turkeys, ostriches, emus, rheas, cassowaries, other ratites, waterfowl, and game birds.

This includes hatching eggs.

1. DOCUMENTATION: Documentation is required for entry of all livestock and poultry and is described below. Examples of forms can be obtained by visiting

our website.

- a. For out-of-state animals, see each species' specific out-of-state requirements. Upon request, a person who exhibits livestock or poultry shall present for inspection all reports, test results, and appropriate health certificates required to accompany their animal(s).
2. CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (CVI)
 - a. MARYLAND ENTRIES: All Maryland livestock entries must be accompanied by a Maryland Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) for show. It is recommended for rabbits and poultry. Equines are required to have either a VCPR form or CVI (preferred).
 - i. A CVI is valid for 60 days for Maryland fairs and shows, providing that the status of the herd or animal(s) does not change.
 - ii. A CVI is a legible record, made on an official Maryland State form or via an approved electronic CVI platform. CVI's are issued by a licensed Maryland and USDA Category II accredited veterinarian for animals being shown within the state that meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland.
 - iii. The CVI must be completed and signed by a licensed, accredited veterinarian (as described above). Each animal must be properly identified on the CVI. The veterinarian must select if this document is for fair and exhibition season, sale or other (with explanation).
 - iv. The veterinarian is required to send the original paper CVI (white and canary copies) to MDA Headquarters within 7 days of completion. The middle (pink transport copy) is to be retained by the owner and should accompany livestock during travel. The last (goldenrod copy) is for the veterinarian's records.
 - v. Electronic CVI's from an approved platform are recommended. The owner can produce either a digital

- or printed copy.
- vi. Starting in 2026, there is a fee for paper CVI's (\$3/certificate). They will be distributed in packs of 25 (\$75/pack) with a shipping fee of \$25. We will NOT be printing more CVI's, therefore, once our inventory is out, you will be required to use an electronic CVI.
 - vii. In 2027, paper CVI's will no longer be accepted.
- b. **OUT-OF-STATE ENTRIES:** All out-of-state entries must be accompanied by an Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, except poultry.
 - i. The Interstate CVI is valid for no more than 30 days from the date of inspection.
 - ii. An Interstate CVI must be legible, made on an official form of the state of origin, issued by a licensed, accredited veterinarian (both USDA and in the state or origin), and issued for animals being imported to this state within 30 days before the entry of the animals, which shows that the animals listed meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland. If this CVI is completed via an approved electronic platform, the owner can produce either a digital or printed copy.
 - iii. In 2027, paper CVI's will no longer be accepted for any out-of-state entries.
3. **SELF-CERTIFICATION:** A completed Self-Certification form is required for all entries.
 - a. Self-Certification forms must be filled out within 24 hours prior to loading and presented upon request to the designated representative. Owners can produce either a digital or printed copy.
 - i. A Self-Certification is an official Maryland document signed by the owner/caretaker/transporter stating that the animals presented for exhibition are not showing any signs of or having recent exposure to infectious or contagious diseases (within the last 21 days).
 - ii. Forms are species-specific for livestock, equine, poultry and rabbits. They are available on MDA's Animal Health website.
4. **TEST REPORT FORMS:** Testing is required for some species, and if so, a test report form will be required unless otherwise documented on the CVI. See species-specific requirements for details of testing and test report requirements. Examples of test reports are shown below:
 - a. Avian Influenza Test Report
 - b. Pullorum-Typhoid Test Report
 - c. Coggins Test Report (Equine Infectious Anemia)
 - d. Tuberculosis Test Report
 - e. HPAI Milk Test Report for LACTATING DAIRY cattle
5. **MARYLAND POULTRY PREMISES IDENTIFICATION:** All Maryland premises with poultry are required to be registered with MDA. The Poultry Premises number must be noted on the Test Report or other documentation of NPIP U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid and U.S. H5/ H7 Avian Influenza Clean or State H5/ H7 Monitored status. To obtain a poultry premises number, please fill out the application available on our website.
6. **ANIMAL REJECTION POLICY:** Animals may be rejected from an exhibition, either denied entry or removed from the exhibition, as described below:
 - a. **FAILURE TO PROVIDE COMPLETED DOCUMENTATION IS GROUNDS FOR REJECTION.**
 - b. Suspicion of communicable disease is adequate grounds for rejection. Confirmed diagnosis is not required since timely removal of suspicious animals is required by law to protect the remaining animals.
 - c. Livestock with clinical signs of infectious or contagious diseases or external parasites are not permitted entry or allowed to remain at the exhibition. Clinical signs include, but are not limited to, active lesions of ringworm, sore mouth, sore nose, caseous lymphadenitis, mange, or multiple

warts easily visible without close examination.

d. Exposed animals may be rejected if it is believed that there is a potentially serious communicable disease present. All animals originating with the suspect animal may be rejected. Vesicular diseases are of particular concern.

e. All decisions are final.

f. All parties involved will be notified of all rejections, including exhibit sponsors and supervisors.

g. Animal rejections can be made by MDA Animal Health veterinarians or field inspectors, private veterinarians contracted by the show, Maryland Extension employees, or individuals designated by the fair or show as a 'responsible person.'

FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS: CATTLE IDENTIFICATION: INDIVIDUAL IDENTIFICATION OF EACH ANIMAL SHALL BE A 15 DIGIT 840 ISO-COMPLIANT RFID EAR TAG.

RODEO CATTLE must have official individual ID that is recognized by the USDA (9 CFR Parts 71, 77, 78, and 86). Rodeo Cattle are NOT allowed to commingle with any other cattle at the exhibition.

SELF-CERTIFICATION: All cattle exhibitors are required to complete and produce (digital or printed) a Livestock Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health.

MARYLAND CATTLE

- INFLUENZA A: No testing requirements for Maryland cattle.
- BRUCELLOSIS: Maryland is a Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland cattle.
- TUBERCULOSIS: Maryland is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. A tuberculin test is not required for Maryland cattle.
- IMMUNIZATION: Bovine Respiratory Disease Complex vaccination is recommended for all cattle to include Bovine Respiratory

Syncytial Virus, Bovine Viral Diarrhea Virus, Infectious Bovine Rhinotracheitis and Parainfluenza. Leptospirosis vaccination is also recommended.

OUT-OF-STATE CATTLE

- INFLUENZA A:
 - a. For LACTATING DAIRY cattle:
 - i. Defined as a cow that is producing milk, regardless of the volume of milk that she is producing. This does not include dairy calves, pregnant heifers, or dairy cows that are 'dry' or no longer producing milk.
 - ii. A milk sample from all four quarters must be tested for Influenza A within 7 days of travel, and results must be recorded on the CVI. Failure to comply will result in denied entry. A bulk tank sample will not be accepted.
- BRUCELLOSIS:
 - a. Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State, Region or Zone
 - i. No brucellosis test required.
 - b. Non-Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State, Region or Zone
 - i. Official vaccinates under 24 months old with vaccination dates recorded on the Interstate CVI permitted, or
 - ii. Test negative within 30 days before entry.
- TUBERCULOSIS:
 - a. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State, Region or Zone
 - i. No tuberculin test required.
 - b. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - i. All cattle over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
 - ii. 1. Cattle must originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test may be imported without a tuberculin test, or
 - 2. Any individual animal, over 6 months of age, entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import. Status of herd and area must be shown on their certificate.

- **IMMUNIZATION:** Bovine Respiratory Disease Complex vaccination is recommended for all out of state cattle to include Bovine Respiratory Syncytial Virus, Bovine Viral Diarrhea Virus, Infectious Bovine Rhinotracheitis and Parainfluenza. Leptospirosis vaccination is also recommended.

FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS: SWINE

ALL SWINE IDENTIFICATION: INDIVIDUAL IDENTIFICATION OF EACH ANIMAL SHALL BE AN RFID OFFICIAL EAR TAG.

SELF-CERTIFICATION: All swine exhibitors are required to complete and produce (digital or printed) a Livestock Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health.

MARYLAND SWINE

- **BRUCELLOSIS:** Maryland is a Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland swine.
- **PSEUDORABIES:** Maryland is a Pseudorabies Stage V state. Pseudorabies testing is not required for Maryland swine.
- **Immunization:** Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended.

OUT-OF-STATE SWINE

- **BRUCELLOSIS:** All swine, except barrows, 6 months of age and older shall be negative on an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition entry, or originate directly from a validated brucellosis-free herd or brucellosis-free state.
- **PSEUDORABIES:** Swine over 6 months of age shall be negative on an official test for pseudorabies conducted within 30 days prior to exhibition entry, or originate immediately and directly from a Qualified Pseudorabies Negative herd or Stage 4 or Stage 5 Pseudorabies-Free State.

- **IMMUNIZATION:** Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended. All U.S. states are currently swine brucellosis free and pseudorabies free. This is the current status as of

the effective date on this document. It is the exhibitors responsibility to regularly check each state's status for any changes.

FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS: SHEEP AND GOATS

ALL SHEEP AND GOATS IDENTIFICATION: ALL SHEEP AND GOATS MUST BE OFFICIALLY SCRAPIE-IDENTIFIED. OFFICIAL IDENTIFICATION FOR SHEEP INCLUDES THE FOLLOWING:

1. USDA-approved Scrapie ear tags;
2. Legible registration tattoos, for which the breed registration paper shall contain the registry premises or flock tattoo prefix that is linked to the APHIS-assigned PIN and flock ID number of the flock of birth, if breed registry is approved by APHIS; or
3. Legible tattoos consisting of an individual animal number unique within the flock in one ear and the official Scrapie premises identification number (flock ID) in the other ear, except where the tail web or flank may be used for earless animals or animals with damaged ears; must be accompanied by an owner statement.
4. A ISO-compliant 15-digit microchip with official Scrapie identification is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.
5. USDA approved RFID tag.
6. **NOTE:** All animals bearing identification with blue colored scrapie program tags labelled "meat" with a US shield are not permitted to be exhibited in Maryland

SELF-CERTIFICATION: All sheep and goat exhibitors are required to complete and produce (digital or printed) a Livestock Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health. Further clarification on the Federal Scrapie Program can be found at: <https://www.aphis.usda.gov/>

MARYLAND SHEEP

- No additional requirements

OUT-OF-STATE SHEEP

- No additional requirements

MARKET LAMBS

- It is recommended that all lambs be sick shorn prior to entry for inspection for Club Lamb Fungus (sheep ringworm).

MARYLAND GOATS

- BRUCELLOSIS: Maryland is a Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland goats.
- TUBERCULOSIS: Maryland is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Maryland goats.

OUT-OF-STATE GOATS

- BRUCELLOSIS:
 - There are no out of state requirements for brucellosis testing in goats.
- TUBERCULOSIS:
 - Accredited Tuberculosis-Free States, Region or Zone: A tuberculin test is not required.
 - Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
- All goats over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
 - Goats must originate from herds in which all animals are tested negative within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test, may be imported without a tuberculin test, or
 - Any individual animal entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
- Status of herd and area must be shown on their certificate.

FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS:

HORSES, PONIES, MULES, AND OTHER EQUIDAE

ALL EQUINE

- IDENTIFICATION: Individual

official identification shall include the following as applicable: Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test report with photo or drawing of the animal, tattoo, brand, or microchip. Animals using tattoos or brands for official identification must be accompanied by the breed registration papers.

- EQUINE INFECTIOUS ANEMIA (COGGINS) TESTING: All equine for exhibition shall be accompanied by a valid Coggins Test done within 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition.
- SELF-CERTIFICATION REQUIREMENT AND EXEMPTION: An Equine Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health is required for each equine entering a fair/show-type event where multiple livestock species are present. The form must be available for inspection if requested (digital or printed). Those participating in equine-only shows and events are exempt from this requirement; however, it is good practice to thoroughly double check the health and skin condition of the animal before departing for the event. The form provides an easy checklist to do this. Exhibitors may not bring an animal having apparent or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease to a show.
- During disease outbreaks, these requirements may change - please check our website for the most up-to-date requirements or call us at 410.841.5810 for more information.

MARYLAND EQUINE

- VETERINARY-CLIENT-PATIENT RELATIONSHIP (VCPR): ALL equines must have verification of a veterinary-client-patient relationship (VCPR). This can be either a current CVI or EECVI (recommended), however, a completed VCPR form is acceptable. This form is available on our website.

OUT-OF-STATE EQUINE

- All horses and other equidae must be accompanied by a CVI issued within 30 days prior to entry. An

Interstate CVI must be legible, on an official form from the state of origin, issued by a licensed, accredited veterinarian, and issued for animals being imported to this state within 30 days before the entry of the animals, which shows that the animals listed meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland.

FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS: POULTRY

ALL POULTRY

1. PRIVATE SALES WILL BE ALLOWED WITH PROPER DOCUMENTATION OF THE SALE BY THE EXHIBITION SPONSOR AND MAINTAINED FOR ONE YEAR.
2. IDENTIFICATION: ALL POULTRY entering an exhibition must be identified with a numbered leg or wing band.
3. AI TESTING: Owners are required to produce a copy of the test results (digital or printed).
4. All poultry exhibitors are required to complete and produce (digital or printed) a Poultry Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health and Biosecurity Statement.
5. DOCUMENTATION must be provided on MDA-E06 and MDA-E20, VS Form 9-2, VS Form 9-3 or comparable form approved by the State Veterinarian.

MARYLAND POULTRY

1. PREMISES REGISTRATION: All poultry exhibitors originating from Maryland must have valid proof of a registered Maryland Poultry Premises ID Number or Federal Premises ID Number, included on test paperwork.
2. AVIAN INFLUENZA (AI) TESTING REQUIREMENTS: All poultry, including wild birds except pigeons and doves, shown at public exhibitions in the state shall meet the following AI testing requirement:
 - a. Have a negative avian influenza test conducted on a representative sample of 10

BIRDS PER PREMISES within 21

days prior to the event start date.
b. If there are less than 10 birds, then all birds must be tested.

3. SALMONELLA PULLORUM-TYPHOID TESTING REQUIREMENTS: All poultry, 4 months of age or older, except waterfowl, wild birds, pigeons and doves, shown at public exhibitions in the state shall meet one or more of the following requirements:
 - a. Originate directly from an NPIP U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flock as defined in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants), OR
 - i. "Flock" is defined as "all of the poultry on one premises, except any group of poultry that has been segregated for 21 days may be considered a separate flock." (COMAR 15.11.11.02) This pertains to PT testing only.

b. Have a negative official test for Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid within 90 days before fair, exhibition, exposition, or show and remain segregated from all poultry of unknown or positive Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid test status.

i. Segregation is defined as no direct contact between poultry. For biosecurity purposes, it is advised to care for the tested flock before interacting with any untested poultry on site.

OUT-OF-STATE POULTRY

1. AVIAN INFLUENZA (AI) TESTING REQUIREMENTS: All poultry, including wild birds except pigeons and doves, shown at public exhibitions in the state shall meet the following AI testing requirements:

a. Have a negative avian influenza test conducted on a representative sample of

ALL BIRDS IN THE FLOCK within 14 days prior to the opening date of the event.

b. If there are greater than 30 birds in the flock, only 30 birds need to be tested.

2. SALMONELLA PULLORUM-

TYPHOID TESTING

REQUIREMENTS: All poultry, 4 months of age or older, except waterfowl, wild birds, pigeons and doves shown at public exhibitions in the state shall meet one or more of the following requirements:

a. Originate directly from a U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flock as defined in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants), OR

i. "Flock" is defined as "all of the poultry on one premises, except any group of poultry that has been segregated for 21 days may be considered a separate flock." (COMAR 15.11.11.02) This pertains to PT testing only.

b. Have a negative official test for Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid within 90 days before fair, exhibition, exposition, or show and remain segregated from all poultry of unknown or positive Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid test status.

i. Segregation is defined as no direct contact between poultry. For biosecurity purposes, it is advised to care for the tested flock before interacting with any untested poultry on site.

POULTRY BARN

MDA's Animal Health Program is implementing the following biosecurity measures for ALL poultry exhibitions:

1. The Poultry Barn must have clearly designated entrances, exits, and as much as possible, a one-way viewing path for the public.
2. Biosecurity protocols must be in place, including handwashing or hand sanitizing stations. Footbaths/ mats are recommended.
3. Each person who enters the Poultry Barn **MUST**:
 - a. NOT be allowed to touch or handle the birds (unless it is their own personal bird and even then we recommend limiting handling).
 - b. USE hand sanitizer or wash hands upon entering and exiting the barn.
 - c. It is recommended to

DISINFECT footwear before entering and upon exit of the barn. This can be a powder disinfectant or liquid footbath/mat.

4. All visitors to the poultry barn **MUST** follow the above biosecurity guidelines!
5. The fair staff should disinfect the barn walkways in the morning and evening, and if possible, especially on busy days, in the afternoon.
6. Only bird owners or their designated representatives are permitted to handle birds on-site.
7. Those handling birds must wear dedicated footwear that is disinfected after each interaction with birds and must remain on the event grounds for the duration of the event. After the fair, this footwear must be disinfected before returning home to prevent potential disease spread.
8. Signs should be clearly placed around the barn to advise visitors against touching birds.
9. Infographics and information about Avian Influenza should be placed around the barn to provide education for the visitors. Such information can be provided by MDA upon request.

FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS: RABBITS

ALL RABBITS

1. **IDENTIFICATION:** Individual identification of each animal shall be a tag, legible and healed tattoo, or microchip, if the exhibitor provides the reader.
2. All rabbit exhibitors are required to complete and produce (digital or printed) a Rabbit Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health.
3. **RECOMMENDATIONS:**
 - a. It is strongly recommended that all rabbits have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI).
 - b. Vaccination against Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease (RHDV-2) is recommended.
 - i. Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease is of particular concern, and clinical signs include bleeding from eyes, nose, mouth, or have bloody stools.
4. While on exhibit or at any time

following the exhibition, exhibitors and exhibition managers are obligated to report all mass mortality events and all rabbits who show signs of a dangerous transmissible disease to MDA at 410.841.5810.

RABBIT BARN RECOMMENDATIONS AND REFERENCE TO FEDERAL CODE:

- Due to potential high heat and humidity conditions during our exhibition season it is important to maintain proper temperatures and ventilation so animals are not subject to uncomfortable conditions.
 - Since most rabbits do not tolerate temperatures exceeding 85°F, it is recommended that fans, misters, and cold packs in cages be allowed to help the rabbits cope with high temperatures.
 - Ventilation during extreme heat is essential to help with air quality, therefore, cage fans (small, rechargeable/battery-powered stroller fans are ideal) are encouraged to provide airflow for the animals.
- Clip-on rechargeable fans are readily available online.
- Note: We do not encourage or promote any one particular brand of fan.
 - Rabbits will also need to be sheltered from the elements so it is encouraged to have all areas of the barn shaded or out of direct sunlight to avoid overheating of the animals.
- Summary of Federal Code relating to Animal Welfare states the following for Facilities and Operating Standards for Rabbits (9 CFR Part 3 Subpart C 3.51 and 3.52):
 - Indoor housing facilities for rabbits shall be adequately ventilated. Such facilities shall be provided with fresh air either by means of windows, doors, vents, or air conditioning and shall be ventilated so as to minimize drafts, odors, and moisture condensation. Auxiliary ventilation, such as

exhaust fans and vents or air conditioning, shall be provided when the ambient temperature is 85°F or higher.

- Primary enclosures shall be so placed as to protect the rabbits from excessive sunlight.
- When sunlight is likely to cause overheating or discomfort, sufficient shade shall be provided to allow all rabbits to protect themselves from the direct rays of the sun. When the atmospheric temperature exceeds 90°F, artificial cooling shall be provided.

FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS: CAMELIDS

ALL CAMELIDS

IDENTIFICATION: Individual identification of each animal shall be an official metal ear tag or microchip, if the exhibitor provides the reader.

SELF-CERTIFICATION: All camelid exhibitors are required to complete and produce (digital or printed) a Livestock Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health.

MARYLAND CAMELIDS

- **BRUCELLOSIS:** Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland camelids.
- **TUBERCULOSIS:** Tuberculin test is not required for Maryland camelids.

OUT-OF-STATE CAMELIDS

- **BRUCELLOSIS:** Brucellosis testing is not required for out-of-state camelids.
- **TUBERCULOSIS:**
 1. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State, Region or Zone
 - a. No tuberculin test required.
 2. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - a. All camelids over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
 - i. Camelids must originate from a herd not under restriction or quarantine for tuberculosis and from which a complete herd test was conducted within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test may be imported without a tuberculin test,

or

ii. Any individual animal, over 6 months of age, entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.

b. Status of herd and area must be shown on their certificate.

**FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS:
PETTING ZOOS AND COMMERCIAL**

ANIMAL EXHIBITS DEFINITIONS:

- **PETTING ZOO:** An exhibition where the public is encouraged to touch/interact with any livestock or other animals. This can include but is not limited to pony rides and fair and show petting zoos.
- **COMMERCIAL ANIMAL EXHIBIT:** A public display of animals for profit, which can include goat yoga, cow cuddling, piglet snuggling, etc. These exhibits are subject to regulations, such as those under the Animal Welfare Act, which mandate minimum standards of care for animals that are exhibited. Exhibitors must have a valid

Commercial Animal Exhibit

Registration through the Maryland Department of Agriculture. Details can be found on MDA's website.

PETTING ZOOS, COMMERCIAL ANIMAL EXHIBITS, AND PONY RIDES:

- **MUST HAVE THE FOLLOWING:**
 - CVI - including Rabies vaccination status
- Certain exemptions may apply (see below)
 - **SELF CERTIFICATION DOCUMENTS** (completed and produced either digitally or printed)
 - The requirements for each species is the same for fairs and shows (see previous sections)

GENERAL EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS (COMAR 15.11.14.01):

- Applies to ALL animals in a petting zoo
 - Rabies Vaccination:
- A person may not show livestock at any petting zoo unless all exhibited animals in the petting zoo, 12 weeks or older, are vaccinated against rabies as provided in COMAR 10.06.02 (Communicable

Diseases - Rabies), unless there is no rabies vaccine licensed and approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture for that animal species.

- Approved Species – cattle, sheep, horses, dogs, cats and ferrets
- MDA does not require off-label use of the rabies vaccine
- Fairs and shows have authority to set their own requirements above and beyond state requirements
 - Documentation:
- CVI - Issued within 60 days of the exhibition
- Rabies - Proof of adequate rabies vaccination on all required species shall be documented by the veterinarian administering the vaccine. This can be noted on the CVI or written on an approved rabies certificate that is issued by the veterinarian. Proof of vaccination should be presented at the time of entry with the CVI and Self Certification.

■ Self Certification Form - species specific

COMMERCIAL ANIMAL EXHIBITS:

- Exemption of the 60 day CVI
 - On farm, non-traveling exhibits are not required to have a CVI when they possess a valid commercial animal exhibit registration BUT are required to have a rabies vaccine for the animals interacting with people.

BIOSECURITY

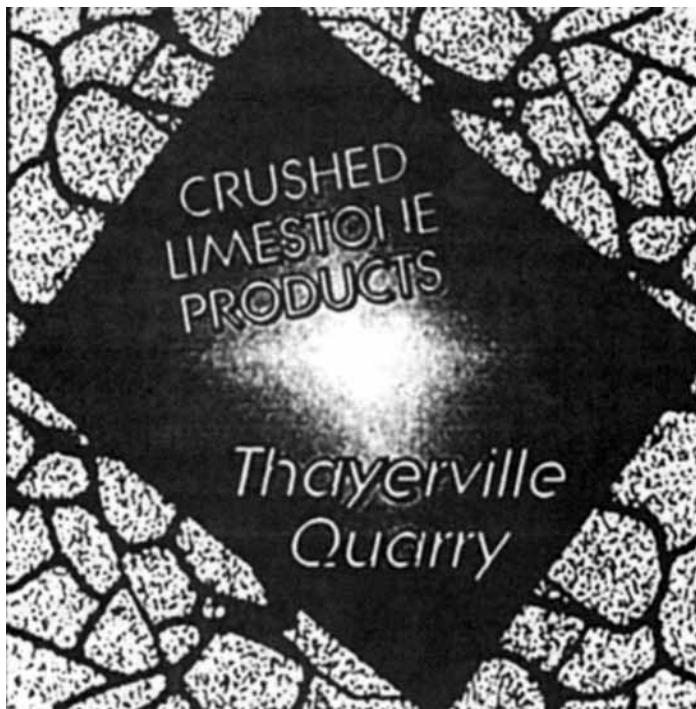
RECOMMENDATIONS:

Biosecurity is a concern when allowing the public to interact with animals on the farm. The introduction of disease to your animals from an outside source could have devastating consequences for not only the animals but also for your business. Typically, in an agritourism petting zoo setting or commercial animal exhibit, you will not know whether visitors have been in contact with other farm animals before coming to your farm. Implementing appropriate biosecurity practices will aid in protecting your animals, visitors, and your business. MDA's

Animal Health Program
recommends the following
biosecurity best practices for ALL
petting zoos and commercial
animal exhibits:

- Communicating rules with visitors
- Displaying clear signage
- Parking visitor vehicles away from
animals
- Insisting on clean footwear and
clothing
- Establishing controlled entry
- Using gates to limit access
- Requiring parental supervision
- Providing handwashing/sanitizing
stations and foot baths

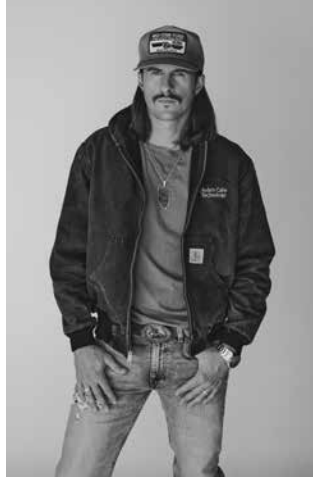

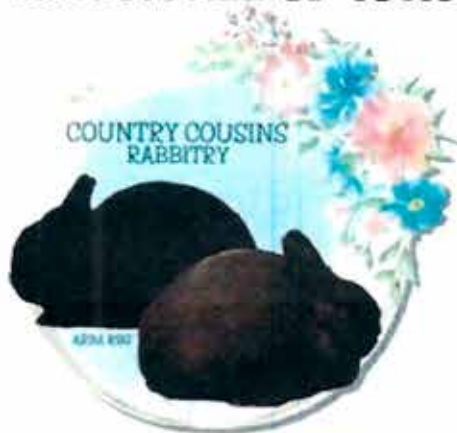

GENERAL RULES

1. All dirt drag participants must be registered by 1 hour before the show time.
2. A current valid driver's license and insurance certificate are required for the driver of tagged vehicles. Any driver under the age of 18 must have a parent present and that parent must sign the parental consent form and liability waiver. Drivers of ATV, SXS, and dirt bike classes must be age 10 or older.
3. **HELMETS AND SEATBELTS/HARNESSES MUST BE WORN WHILE ON THE TRACK**
4. You must pay regular admission to the fair at the main gate. This does NOT count as your entry into the pits. General admission is charged by the fair, not Intimidation Motorsports, and is separate from participating in track events. The registration fee for this event is \$40 per vehicle; \$20 is paid at the pit gate, and \$20 is paid when you register your vehicle. Driver will have their \$20 pit gate fee deducted at registration. This is limited to ONE pit gate fee per driver, regardless of the number of classes ran – no exceptions. There will be no other reimbursements or refunds of any kind for any reason. Any additional pit helpers will pay a \$20 pit fee.
5. All vehicles participating in the grudge race will pay an entry fee of \$10 per race.
6. Anyone wishing to participate in the Grudge Racing event after the main event must have their vehicles in the pit area BEFORE the main event has started. No vehicles will be permitted into the pit area after the event has started. **NO EXCEPTIONS**
7. The order and bracket set up will be determined prior to the start of the first round by chip pulls.
8. All competitors participate at their own risk to themselves and their equipment. All contestants and pit personnel must sign a waiver to participate in the event, understanding that they are competing at their own risk and that they will not bring suit against any officials, employees, promoters, or property owners. By signing the release form, you agree to all rules set forth.
9. Only trucks that are licensed and tagged for street use are allowed to participate.
10. Vehicles will be inspected and it will be determined by the tech officials if permitted to run.
11. All drivers must attend a mandatory driver's meeting held before the event begins to be held in the pit area.
12. If a driver is not at lineup within two minutes of being called to the track, that driver will be disqualified with no refund. You know when you will be running, so pay attention.
13. After their run, winners must return to the staging area immediately in order to stage for the next round.
14. Competition vehicles must be operated in a safe manner AT ALL TIMES within the confines of the track, the pit area, and the staging area. Track officials have the right to stop and disqualify any vehicle which is being operated recklessly. **PIT AND STAGING AREA SPEED LIMIT 5 MPH.**
15. No one is allowed on the track except for the track officials and contestants.
16. The driver must stop immediately upon the signal of the red flag from the flagman.
17. Track officials will have the option to inspect vehicles and check competitors for rule violations any time during the event. The contest will be governed by track officials with all decision's final with no appeal process.
18. Track officials reserve the right to change any safety rules, or any rules in the general ruleset, at any time if they feel there is a necessity to do so.
19. Any parts dropped from the vehicle during the competition will result in disqualification.
20. Classes may be added or cut if necessary. There must have at least 4 participants to make the class. If not, competitors must jump to the next class.
21. Each vehicle and each driver may only be entered into competition 1 time per class.
22. No loose objects in the cab or any place else in/on the vehicle.
23. Track officials have the authority to disqualify with no appeal process.
24. Drivers must stay with their vehicles while their class is participating. Failure to remain with your vehicle can result in disqualification.
25. Any vehicle that touches the white line will be disqualified.
26. Tether kill switches highly recommended on ATV, UTV's and bikes.
27. Any machine running a power adder MUST have a wheelie bar or it will not run.
28. If gas tanks have been moved, they must be secured.
29. Any contestant violating rules of conduct (examples include recklessness,



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intoxication) may be disqualified and/or removed from the grounds by Intimidation Motorsports staff with no refund. Alcohol and drugs are not allowed. Any driver or any member of his/her pit crew consuming alcohol or drugs before or during the event, or is in any way found to be intoxicated, will be disqualified from the event, subject to immediate ejection from the event, and will forfeit any prize money. Drivers will be held responsible for the actions of their crew members.

30. Fighting or other misconduct on the track, in the pits, or in the stands will not be tolerated. All parties will be suspended from all events operated by Intimidation Motorsports until the situation has been resolved with Intimidation Motorsports and any of its partners, if applicable. Any registration fees, including pre-registration fees, will not be refunded, and any prize money will be forfeited.
31. All drag racing decisions made by the officials are FINAL with no appeal process.

CLOTHING REQUIREMENTS

2. Chin straps must be strapped.
3. All drivers of ATV, SXS, and bikes must wear either eye goggles or full-face shields while racing.
4. Long pants and long sleeve shirts are highly recommended.
5. Closed toed shoes (leather boots preferred)

DRAG RACING AREA:

1. All drag racing will be conducted on a dirt surface.
2. Two side-by-side lanes will be marked by a white chalk line and orange cones.
3. The normal drag race track will be set at 200'.
4. It will be the determination of the officials to cancel racing if unsafe weather conditions are present.
5. All races will be started by a pre-stage pro tree.
6. Crossing of any lane lines will be a loss for that race.

CLASS INFORMATION:

YOUTH 2 WHEELS CLASS RULES:

1. Must be between ages 4 - 12
2. Must meet all safety requirements.
3. All general rules apply.

YOUTH 4 WHEELS CLASS RULES:

3. Intakes, exhaust manifold may be modified.
4. After market swing arm are permitted.
5. Any tires and wheels are permitted.
6. Wheelie bars are permitted.
7. Straps or tie-downs are permitted.
8. Tether kill switch is highly recommended.
9. Nitrous Oxide is permitted.
10. Must have a full coverage helmet.
11. Must meet all safety requirements.
12. All general rules apply.

TRUCK CLASS RULES:

1. Any street legal gas or diesel truck/SUV permitted. Trucks must be tagged and insured (no dealer or transport tags). Registration card and license plate must match and state inspection.
2. Must retain full factory interior, no gutted race trucks.
3. All tires must have a DOT stamp. No cut, bar, paddle or scoop tires allowed. No studded tire and no tire chains.
4. Must retain factory O.E.M. chassis. Aftermarket bolt on suspension modifications permitted.
5. Dually wheel trucks must have dually wheel bed.
6. Must have all glass windows.
7. Must have all body panels.
8. Once the opponent has both stage beams lit, you will have 10 seconds to get your light lit or you will be disqualified.
9. Not stopping safely will result in immediate disqualification.
10. Must meet all safety requirements.
11. All general rules apply.

RWYB CLASS RULES:

1. Must meet all safety requirements.
2. All general rules apply.

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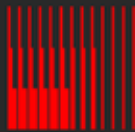
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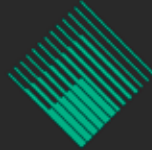

RULES

RULES:

1. All drivers must fill out an entry form before taking part in the event.
2. Only drivers, owners, mechanics, etc. that sign an insurance release will be permitted on the track.
3. Drivers must be 16 years old and have a valid driver's license. Proof of age is required. The only exceptions will be with the ATV, SXS, and dirt bike classes which allow ages 10 and older.
4. Any contestant violating rules of conduct (examples include recklessness, intoxication) may be disqualified and/or removed from the grounds by Intimidation Motorsports staff with no refund. Alcohol and drugs are not allowed. Any driver or any member of his/her pit crew consuming alcohol or drugs before or during the event, or is in any way found to be intoxicated, will be disqualified from the event, subject to immediate ejection from the event, and will forfeit any prize money. Drivers will be held responsible for the actions of their crew members.
5. Fighting or other misconduct on the track, in the pits, or in the stands will not be tolerated. All parties will be suspended from all events operated by Intimidation Motorsports until the situation has been resolved with Intimidation Motorsports and any of its partners, if applicable. Any registration fees, including pre-registration fees, will not be refunded, and any prize money will be forfeited.
6. Modifications are acceptable in any class. Open cabs must have a roll bar.
7. All truck drivers must wear a seatbelt.
8. ALL drivers of ATV, SXS, and bikes must wear a helmet.
9. Truck drivers are encouraged to have a fire extinguisher inside the vehicle.
10. No loose objects in a vehicle. No added weights.
11. Vehicles must have a way to hook up or vehicle may not run.
12. Vehicles must have a secure pullback hitch. NO CLEVIS PROVIDED
13. No riders allowed in the vehicle during competition.
14. No one allowed in the competition area except officials.
15. The course will be marked. Crossing boundaries will result in disqualification.
16. Stop immediately if you make it through the pit. If you continue to drag the cable into the pits, you will be disqualified.
17. You will be stopped by the official if they feel the vehicle can no longer move forward under its own power in the pit. No backing up.
18. No reckless driving or speeding anywhere in the pit area.
19. Vehicles will be classified by wheel size only, NOT wheelbase or engine size for all classes EXCEPT Down on the Farm.
20. Vehicles must be registered no later than one hour before starting time.
21. You must pay regular admission to the fair at the main gate. This does NOT count as your entry into the pits. General admission is charged by the fair, not Intimidation Motorsports, and is separate from participating in track events. The registration fee for this event consists of \$20 which is paid at the pit gate, and either \$5 or \$10 (depending on class) which is paid when you register your vehicle. Driver will have their \$20 pit gate fee deducted at registration. This is limited to ONE pit gate fee per driver, regardless of the number of classes ran – no exceptions. There will be no other reimbursements or refunds of any kind for any reason. Any additional pit helpers will pay a \$20 pit fee.
22. The same truck can run in the same class as long as it is a different driver.
23. The same truck can bump up in classes without changing tires.



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24. All competitors participate at their own risk to themselves and their equipment. All contestants and pit personnel must sign a waiver to participate in the event, understanding that they are competing at their own risk and that they will not bring suit against any officials, employees, promoters, or property owners. RULES AND REGULATIONS

PRESENTED BY INTIMIDATION MOTORSPORTS

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

These rules are designed to ensure a fair, equal, and consistent inspection process, as well as to ensure the safety of all drivers, spectators, and staff. These rules apply to everyone at all events promoted by Intimidation Motorsports events, even if you elect not to read them.

GENERAL RULES AND PROCEDURES

1. Pre-ran cars must be approved by Intimidation Motorsports before the show. Please message us to discuss. Don't assume you'll be allowed to run just because you showed up with the vehicle.
2. All drivers must sign in and register no later than 1 hour prior to start time which is when inspection and registration close. Vehicle must be in line for inspection before closing time.
3. Just because it is not stated in the rules does not mean you can do it. Officials have the final call on any discussed topic of issues not meeting the rules. If you have questions, and to avoid failing tech, contact Wendel Hartman with Intimidation Motorsports before doing something by either messaging him on Facebook, or text/call him at 301-501-0243. No gray area building. All rules will be enforced. Follow them or you will not run. We understand that people will bend the rules, push allowances to the max, or think of things we haven't thought of yet. We can always address things at the next drivers' meeting.
4. Every driver and every crew person **MUST** sign the release waiver. Every driver over the age of 18 without a valid driver's license **MUST** present a valid state-issued ID card for all classes except lawn mowers.
5. Participants in all classes who are under the age of 18 are also required to submit a signed parental consent form and a parent must be present during the derby. **NO ONE UNDER 16 YEARS OF AGE IS PERMITTED TO DRIVE IN ANY CLASS EXCEPT THE LAWN MOWER CLASSES.** Stock mower classes allows ages 10 and up. Intimidation mower class allows ages 12 and up. **NO EXCEPTIONS.**
6. The promoter or tech inspectors reserve the right to approve or reject any or all entries, and have the final say. If you feel something is a gray area, call or message us so we can clarify for you **BEFORE** the event so your time and ours is not wasted. The officials' decision is final.
7. If your vehicle doesn't pass inspection and changes are not made to pass inspection, your vehicle will not participate. You have two chances to pass tech. If you don't pass the second time, you will not run.
8. After a vehicle is inspected, it must go to the lineup area to be impounded and must not return to the pit stall. If you're caught back in the pit, or if you are caught back in your car before you run and after you have been inspected, **YOU WILL BE DISQUALIFIED.** If you need to access your car for any reason, tell an official so you can be escorted to your car.
9. Driver **MUST** be present for inspection.
10. Officials reserve the right to re-inspect any vehicle at any time before, during, or after the event. Any vehicles due to receive prize money are subject to inspection before any prize is paid out. If any driver wants to challenge another driver's car **AFTER** it has passed inspection, they must pay a \$200 fee for the challenge. If the car is cheated, that

car and driver will be disqualified and will not receive any refunds, and the challenger will get the \$200 back. If the car is found to have been built to the rules, the driver whose car was challenged gets to keep \$100 of the challenger's protest fee, and Intimidation Motorsports keeps the other \$100. All decisions by officials are final with no appeal process.

11. All drivers must attend the drivers meeting. If you are not present for it, you will not participate.

12. With regard to the Mineral County Fair: You must pay \$30 admission to the pits. There is no additional driver's registration fee. This also allows you to access to the fair, but not the rides.

With regard to the Garrett County Fair: You must pay regular admission to the fair at the main gate. This does NOT count as your entry into the pits. General admission is charged by the fair, not Intimidation Motorsports, and is separate from participating in track events. The registration fee for this event is \$50 per car/driver; \$20 is paid at the pit gate, and \$30 is paid when you register your vehicle at the fairgrounds. Any additional pit helpers will pay a \$20 pit fee. Driver will have their \$20 pit gate fee deducted at registration. Registration for additional classes is \$30 per class. This is limited to ONE pit gate fee per driver, regardless of the number of classes ran – no exceptions. There will be no other reimbursements or refunds of any kind for any reason.

With regard to Battlegang's The Kickback, pit entry fees and registration fees will be announced at a later date. Watch our Intimidation Motorsports Facebook page for this information.

13. Being under the influence of drugs or alcohol will not be tolerated by anyone on the premises. Any driver or any member of his/her pit crew consuming alcohol or drugs before or during the event, or is in any way found to be intoxicated, will be disqualified from the event with no refunds, subject to immediate ejection from the event, and will forfeit any prize money. Drivers will be held responsible for the actions of their crew members. Breathalyzers are on site.

14. Fighting or other misconduct on the track, in

the pits, or in the stands by a driver or their crew member will not be tolerated and will cause the car to be disqualified. All parties will be banned from all events operated by Intimidation Motorsports until the situation has been resolved with Intimidation Motorsports and any of its partners, if applicable. Any registration fees, including pre-registration fees, will not be refunded. Drivers are responsible for their actions and the actions of their crew members. All drivers and pit crew are to obey track officials at all times.

15. Intimidation Motorsports, its partners, and the fair association will not be responsible for any theft, accident, or damage to persons and/or property caused by anyone at any time, including drivers or crew, on the track, in the pit area, or anywhere else at the event, nor for any cars, parts, or personal property before, during, or after the event. All vehicles must be removed from the track and pit areas before the end of the night.

16. Children in the pit area MUST remain with an adult AT ALL TIMES.

17. No saving of parking spaces in the pit.

18. You will be allowed one rollover. If the vehicle is deemed safe, you may run it again. If you flip a second time, you are out.

19. If a car gets stuck on a tire or another vehicle, they must still actively try to get unstuck and make a hit within the one minute time frame or will be counted out. Vehicles will only be unhooked if the vehicles hooked are the last two running in the feature.

20. All drivers must remain aggressive and must make a hit every minute – NO SANDBAGGING OR TAG TEAMING ALLOWED; YOU WILL ONLY BE WARNED ONCE BEFORE BEING DISQUALIFIED. The one minute time limit is enforced by track officials for restarts and for making AGGRESSIVE contact with another live car. This does NOT mean simply bumping another car. If you're hung up and making a strong effort to get free, you may be given more time. If you are sandbagging, you may get less time. THIS IS AN OFFICIALS DECISION.

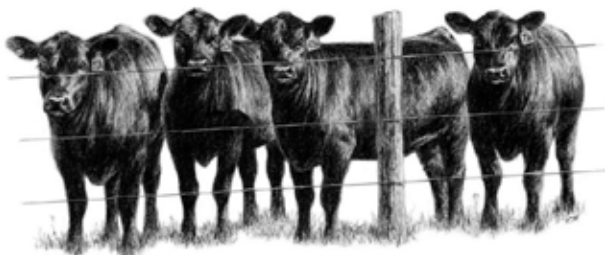
21. Every vehicle must have a maximum of five (5) gallons of fuel, every tractor must have a maximum of two (2) gallons of fuel.

22. You will only be allowed 2 vehicle fires. You

- may run after the first fire, but if you catch fire again, you're out.
23. No deliberate hitting on a driver's door. THIS WILL RESULT IN DISQUALIFICATION.
 24. Functioning safety belts, DOT approved helmets, and eye protection (safety glasses, goggles, or face shields) are MANDATORY. Long pants, long sleeve shirts/jackets, neck braces, gloves, and boots are highly recommended.
 25. Cars are to remain in the designated derby area while competing.
 26. A vehicle will be disqualified if any door comes open during the event.
 27. No one is permitted to ride on the outside of a car at any time; this includes while the vehicle is being removed from the track.
 28. Feature winners will be determined by the last car running that makes contact with another car within the allotted time. If two cars get hung up on the last hit, we will separate the cars one time.
 28. Drivers must remain in their vehicles with their helmet and seatbelt on until the event is over unless you are fleeing the vehicle for safety reasons during a red flag. Vehicle and driver will be disqualified if either are removed beforehand. VEHICLE AND DRIVER WILL BE DISQUALIFIED IF DRIVER EXITS VEHICLE DURING AN ACTIVE DERBY.

GENERAL BUILD RULES

1. If you have any questions about something you wish to do to your car that is not covered in the rules, please contact us prior to doing it to determine whether or not it is permitted.
2. If any round or square tubing, plating, or welding is found, inside of the frame, you will not run. You will not be given the option to remove it, and you will not be issued any refunds of any kind.
3. All glass, plastic, and pot metal must be removed. Nothing is to remain in the bottom of the doors or trunk. Vehicle must be swept clean. No junk tires, trash, wheels, metal parts, broken glass, etc. allowed in car.
4. Front dash may remain in the vehicle or you may remove it.
5. Driver's door panel may be left in place.
6. All outer hardware must be removed, including door handles, mirrors, chrome, molding, fiberglass, etc.

7. All glass must be removed including windshield, side windows, rear window, sunroof, headlights, and tail lights.
8. All flammable material must be removed.
9. ALL AIRBAGS MUST BE REMOVED!!!! YOU WILL NOT RUN WITH THEM STILL IN YOUR CAR.
10. The car's computer and wiring may be relocated and secured with spray foam.
11. Front seat must be securely bolted to the floor.
12. All cars MUST have a roof sign for numbers. Drivers will place their number on a sign and secure it to the roof of their car so the announcer can easily see the number. Roof signs are for identification only. Roof signs must be no bigger than 24" long by 24" tall, and must be securely fastened with a bolt through the roof. NO PROFANITY WILL BE ALLOWED ON ANY PORTION OF THE VEHICLE. You will be required to cover it up or not run.
13. All cars are encouraged to have a number on both the driver's and passenger's doors.
14. Painting the driver's door a high-vis color is highly recommended, but not mandatory run. Total reinforcement in the driver's door area is also highly recommended for maximum safety.
15. Driver's door may be foamed for protection.
16. You cannot have too much driver's door protection. WE CANNOT STRESS ENOUGH HOW IMPORTANT THIS RULE IS.
17. All vehicles must have dependable brakes at all times.

6 & 8 CYL SWAP STOCK NOTE: ALL GENERAL RULES APPLY TO ALL CLASSES

VEHICLE REQUIREMENTS

1. Any factory built 6 or 8 cylinder car is permitted. Car must be stock unless modification is clearly written.
2. No t-tops, convertibles, limousines, or checkered cabs allowed.
3. This is a basic build with few modifications. Anything outside of the rules stated below will result in cutting or possible disqualification.
4. Every vehicle (excluding mowers) must have a maximum of five (5) gallons of fuel.

ENGINE AND TRANNY

1. 6 cylinder or 8 cylinder engines are permitted.
2. Stock engine swaps are permitted. Ford to Chevy, Chevy to Dodge, etc. No alcohol conversions.
3. Motor mounts can be welded solid but cannot be relocated.
4. Transmission mounts must have factory mount. No solid mounting.
5. No bracing of transmission.
6. Wiring harnesses are permitted. After market computers are permitted.
7. Aftermarket shifters, gas pedals, and brake pedals are permitted.
8. Headers are permitted.
9. Any 5 lug rear, no bracing, no axle savers, and must run factory style trailing arms in factory location.
10. Slider shafts are permitted.
11. Original cooling system or less is permitted. Radiator protectors are permitted.

BUMPERS

1. Any factory OEM bumpers permitted, bumpers may be seam welded, no loading.
2. A B&B style bumper is permitted. Bumper may be 1/4" max material, may have a point, max 4" over 34" span. No heavy style. 4" x 4" x 1/4" square tubing with caps is permitted. End caps must have a 2" hole for inspection.
3. All bumper holes may be covered with 1/4" patch.
4. No sharp edges.
5. Mounting of bumper: You may hardnose. If hard nosing, you may use a 6"x 6" x 1/4" plate. You may have an 8" stub back the frame horn and welded all the way around. You may have a piece of chain or strap welded from the top of the frame around

the bumper to the bottom of the frame. We don't want anyone to lose a bumper.

6. Absolutely no material inside of frames. Scoping will be performed. Officials reserve the right to drill any suspected area.

FRAMES/UNIBODY

1. Frames are to remain stock. K member and unibody are considered frame in this class and are not to be altered or welded in any fashion. Welding on frame is limited to mounting of bumper.
2. No plating, pinning, creasing, pinching, or shortening of frame.
3. Absolutely no shortening. You can minimally square off edge of frame for flush mounting surface.
4. Rear frame may be dimpled or cut to help roll.
5. Eight 4" x 4" x 1/4" patch plates are permitted.

BODY

1. Driver's door may be welded solid or have door skin.
2. All other doors and trunk can be welded, banded, chained or 9 wired. If welding you get 2 4"x4"x 1/4" max flat plates per vertical seam and 1 per horizontal. If using chain you get 2 chains per vertical seam one per horizontal. If 9 wiring 8 spots per door double stranded.
3. Trunk may be tucked. Quarters must remain upright. You may dip the trunk lid 6" max. Measure from tip of quarter panels, which must remain upright.
4. Creasing is permitted.
5. The hood must have a minimum 12" x 12" holes and trunk must have a 12" x 12" hole for inspection. You are permitted to rebolt metal in 10 total spots around each inspection hole 3/8" bolts max.
6. Speaker deck must remain in car and in factory location.
7. Hood may be fastened in 6 spots by chain or bolting. If bolting, you may only do so utilizing 6" long 2" x 2" x 1/4" angle iron, 1/2" bolts max. You may have two pieces of all thread (1" max) through the core support connected to the frame. You may have 4" washers max. You may replace front body mounts.
8. All body mounts must remain in stock

location and in stock form. May replace bolts with 3/4" max.

9. In two separate spots, one braided strand of 9 wire may go around the bumper through the core support. No crisscrossing these strands.

WHEELS AND TIRES

1. Front and rear tires: Any tire and wheel combo, including skid steer and V treads, are permitted.
2. Weld in centers are permitted.
3. Lip protectors and valve stem protectors are permitted.

SUSPENSION

1. Front and rear suspension must be factory.
2. Ball joints must be stock.
3. A arms may be welded using 2" x 1/4" strapping in four locations.

STEERING

1. Aftermarket steering columns are permitted.
2. All steering components are to remain stock.
3. Tie rods may be reinforced or use heims.

CAGE

1. Rear seat bar and front window strap is mandatory. Window bar must run from roof to cowl.
2. Rear window bar is recommended.
3. Two 12 volt batteries of any type are allowed. Batteries must be relocated to the front passenger seat area or floorboard area. Batteries must be securely fastened to the floor and covered.
4. Gas tanks may be suspended off of the rear bar with a simple protector. May touch but cannot be connected to the rear seat area. If not running a gas tank off of the rear seat bar, gas tank must be mounted in center rear seat area. Absolutely no plastic tanks or stock tanks.
5. Max width of cage material can be 4" x 4" or 2" x 6".
6. A simple 4 point cage is permitted, 4" x 4" or 2" x 6" max. Dash bar must be 5" from firewall and trans tunnel and side bars must stop no more than 6" past B pillar. Simple up and across halo is permitted, 4" x 4" or 2" x 6" max. Must run straight up and across.

4 & 6 CYL COMPACT CAR CHAIN AND BANG

NOTE: ALL GENERAL RULES APPLY TO ALL CLASSES

Just because it is not stated in the rules does not mean you can do it. Officials have the final call on any discussed topic of issues not meeting the rules. If you have questions, and to avoid failing tech, contact

VEHICLE REQUIREMENTS

1. Any factory built 4 or 6 cylinder compact car with a 114" wheelbase or less is permitted.
2. No 8 cylinder cars allowed.
3. No t-tops or convertibles allowed.
4. No engine swaps. AWD cars must remove one driveshaft.
5. No welding anywhere except seat bar and driver's door unless otherwise stated in these rules.
6. Any modifications other than what has been described in these rules will lead to disqualification.
7. Every vehicle (excluding mowers) must have a maximum of five (5) gallons of fuel.

BODY PREPARATION

1. No wedge cars, creasing, bending, forming, or body shaping anywhere on the car.
2. No all thread anywhere on the car except hood pins.
3. Fenders and quarter panels may be cut away for clearance, but must remain stock angle.
4. All body mounts, bolts, rubber, washers, spacers, etc. must be factory and must remain in factory location.
5. Driver's door may be welded shut. Other doors must be chained or wired shut in 6 spots max per door.
6. Body mounts must be factory, no aftermarket bolts.
7. Fresh car means fresh and not pre-bent. You will not run if you pre-bend a fresh car

FIX-IT PLATES

1. A maximum of six 4 x 4 x 3/16" fix-it plates are permitted per car. Plates may be used to repair rust or damage from a previous derby. Each plate may be welded the whole way around it. All plates must be on the outside of the frame and painted fluorescent green. You will not run if there are any plates found inside the frame. If the rule gets abused, we will not allow fix-it plates in the future. Don't be that guy who ruins this for others!

HOODS AND TRUNKS

1. All cars must run a hood.
2. Hood MUST be open for inspection.
3. Hood must be wired, chained, or bolted shut in at least two spots using two pieces of 3/4" all thread through hood and core support. This will be done AFTER inspection when you line up immediately after inspection.
4. Hood and trunk lids may be wired or chained in up to 6 locations. No bolting down the trunk lid.
5. Hood and trunk lid MUST have a 12" x 12" access holes in them for inspection and safety.
6. Hood overhang may be cut off or folded down.
7. Trunk lid may be tucked down in the center halfway, but may not be attached to the floor.
8. Sunroofs must be covered, NO EXCEPTIONS.
9. Trunk lids are allowed to be removed.
10. No other welding is allowed at all unless it is specifically mentioned within these rules

STEERING AND SUSPENSION

1. No modifications to the steering or suspension allowed. Must be the stock OEM equipment for that vehicle.
2. A-arms must be factory. No aftermarket A-arms or added metal plates.
3. Struts must be factory. No aftermarket struts. Risers are allowed.
4. Coil springs may be wired in.
5. Inspectors may drill or unbolt as necessary if they think that something has been tampered to ensure that all rules are being followed.
6. Car must bounce.

BRAKES AND TIRES

1. Car must have working brakes at all times.

2. Any tire/rim combo is allowed. Four wheels max per car. No dual tires.
3. No split rims or studded tires.
4. Wheel weights must be removed.
5. Tire flaps are allowed.
6. Valve stem protectors are allowed.
7. Tubing tires are allowed.

FRAME/UNIBODY

1. No frame or unibody welding of any kind allowed.
2. No filling frame or body holes with spray foam.
3. Crush boxes cannot be removed or altered. Leave it stock.
4. If you have frame repair questions, message Intimidation Motorsports through our Facebook page before you come to the show for instructions on how to fix it.

BUMPERS

1. Any factory OEM bumpers permitted, bumpers may be seam welded, no loading.
2. A B&B style bumper is permitted. Bumper may be 1/4" max material, may have a point, max 4" over 34" span. No heavy style. 4" x 4" x 1/4" square tubing with caps is permitted. End caps must have a 2" hole for inspection. No round pipe allowed.
3. All bumper holes may be covered with 1/4" patch.
4. No sharp edges.
5. Mounting of bumper: You may hardnose. If hard nosing, you may use a 6"x 6" x 1/4" plate. You may have an 8" stub back the frame horn and welded all the way around. You may have a piece of chain or strap welded from the top of the frame around the bumper to the bottom of the frame. We don't want anyone to lose a bumper.
6. Absolutely no material inside of frames. Scoping will be performed. Officials reserve the right to drill any suspected area.
7. If you have any questions, please contact us to discuss.

COOLING SYSTEMS

1. Radiator must be stock OEM or less, only mount in factory location or be removed. Radiator protectors are permitted.
2. Radiators are water only. Antifreeze must be removed.
3. No homemade radiators or reservoir tanks



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allowed.

- Air conditioner equipment must be drained or removed.
- Radiators may be spray foamed in place.
- Electrical fans are allowed.
- Transmission coolers are allowed, but must remain under the hood and NOT in the driver's compartment.

ENGINE AND TRANSMISSION

- Engine and transmission must be stock for the make and model of the car.
- No engine cradles allowed.
- Homemade and aftermarket motor mounts are allowed.
- Carb conversion kits are allowed.
- Headers or stock exhaust are allowed.
- No header protectors.
- Headers must point straight up in the air.
- Differentials may be welded.

DRIVER'S COMPARTMENT & WINDSHIELD

- One window bar in the front windshield and one bar in the back windshield are required. This must be a flat bar or pipe 2" max from roof to cowl, or from roof to interior floor, which may be welded to a plate no larger than 4" x 4" and must not be attached to the trunk lid. Rollover bar must not be welded or bolted to the roof.
- Two 12 volt batteries of any type are allowed. Batteries must be relocated to the front passenger seat area or floorboard area. Batteries must be securely fastened to the floor and covered.
- Gas tank must be removed and a steel tank or fuel cell must be used. No factory fuel tanks allowed. Gas tank must be securely fastened and covered
- Electric fuel pumps are allowed. An ON/OFF switch must be mounted to either side of the steering column on the dash with the OFF in the down position. Fuel line must run inside of the car or run over the dash, and hood must have a notch for them. Fuel line must be HIGH PRESSURE FUEL LINE. All connections must be double clamped.
- A minimum of 3" x 3" x 1/2" round or square tube will be allowed behind the driver's seat from post to post UNLESS you have a four-point cage.
- Gas tanks may be suspended off of the rear bar with a simple protector. May touch but

cannot be connected to the rear seat area. If not running a gas tank off of the rear seat bar, gas tank must be mounted in center rear seat area. Absolutely no plastic tanks or stock tanks.

- Max width of cage material can be 4" x 4" or 2" x 6".
- A simple 4 point cage is permitted, 4" x 4" or 2" x 6" max. Dash bar must be 5" from firewall and trans tunnel and side bars must stop no more than 6" past B pillar. Simple up and across halo is permitted, 4" x 4" or 2" x 6" max. Must run straight up and across.
- A chain, cable, bar, or #9 wire must be used in the front windshield area from the cowl to the roof. This is for the driver's protection.
- #9 wire will be limited inside the car. Only one strand per side in the back seat area connecting the floor to the roof.
- Driver's door protection is allowed to go 10" from the front driver's door seam forward AND 10" past the B pillar (driver's door seam). The door protection overlap rule is for the outside of the door. If you use door protection inside the car, then you must go by the cage rule.
- Speaker deck must remain stock and intact in the car.

BONE STOCK TRACTORS

NOTE: ALL GENERAL RULES APPLY TO ALL CLASSES

This class is designed for, but not limited to, beginner drivers and new enthusiasts to join the sport. Therefore, we will not allow any strengthening of tractors unless noted for safety purposes.

Just because it is not stated in the rules does not mean you can do it. Officials have the final call on any discussed topic of issues not meeting the rules. No gray area building. All rules will be enforced. Follow them or you will not run. We understand that people will bend the rules, push allowances to the max, or think of things we haven't thought of yet. We can always address things at the next drivers' meeting

RULES:

- Any lawn or garden tractor is permitted. No old school old iron garden tractors, no rear engine riders, and absolutely no shaft driven tractors.

2. DOT approved helmets, and eye protection (safety glasses, goggles, or face shields) are MANDATORY FOR ALL DRIVERS. Long pants, long sleeve shirts/jackets, neck brace, gloves, and boots are highly recommended for adults, and mandatory for drivers under the age of 16.
 3. Tractors will remain stock from the factory unless addressed in the rules.
 4. NO MOWER DECKS ALLOWED. You must remove all plastic items and headlights except for the hood.
 5. Brakes must work. Forward and reverse must also work.
 6. Absolutely no welding anywhere on the tractor except leg guards and bumper. Must run leg protectors/cage. Cage may be welded to fenders or foot rest and may be connected to the frame, one place per side. Leg guards/cage cannot extend more than 3" in front of the foot rest. Must run a full body mower, 1/4" max material. You will be allowed to weld a plate over the exhaust hole in the frame no bigger than 1/4" thick and the plate cannot be any bigger than 1" bigger than the hole. This will be checked. Must have stock dash.
 7. A back bar can be added for safety purposes only. No hitting in the rear of other tractors.
 8. Front and back bumpers are allowed, however cannot be any wider than the width of the center of the tire. Max size of 2" x 2" x 1/4" square tubing is allowed. No points. Brackets can be welded to the frame but may not extend past the center of the front axle. NO SHARP EDGES.
 9. NO SHARP EDGES.
 10. NO PULLEY SWAPS ALLOWED.
 11. Stock steering. No modifications. Must use stock tie rods, but they may be reinforced. No aftermarket parts.
 12. No modified spindles. Must remain stock to that tractor. No welded front axle. Must be floating as it came from the factory.
 13. Stock ignition. A push button and toggle switch may be used.
 14. Exhaust may be straight. Maximum 15" above the hood OR factory exhaust.
 15. Any engine, maximum 20 hp, must be belt driven somewhere with no modifications. No aftermarket engines. No diesel engines. No alcohol in tractor or driver.
 16. Must run a metal hood and grill. No plastics.
- If stock hood is plastic or fiberglass, you may use sheet metal to make one. Can be seam welded, riveted or screwed together. No added reinforcements. Can run two 3/4" pieces of all tread through the front frame up through the hood. NO KICKERS.
17. MUST HAVE NUMBER VISIBLE ON THE HOOD AND/OR SIDES. NO SHARP EDGES.
 18. No engine braces or cradles. May run spark plug protector, but must only be connected to the engine.
 19. Can run aftermarket gas tank, shifter and gas pedal. Gas tank must be put in a safe spot and fastened down securely. No gas tank under the seat. Must have kill switch and gas shut off switch. This is MANDATORY. Hoses must have clamps. You can run a fuel cell, max of 2 gallons.
 20. Battery must be secured in a safe spot and visible. If not secured, you will have to take it off.
 21. Tires and rims are to remain stock with no modifications. 6" max on the front, 12" max on the rear. No wheel protectors. Rubber tire flaps are permitted. Tires may have tubes - air only. Valve stem protectors are allowed. Snow blower tires are allowed. V bar tires are allowed. No tire chains. Tires must hold air only. No cement, water, foam, or any other material may be used.
 22. All tractors may have four 2" x 2" x 1/4" patch plates.
 23. Pre-run or damaged tractors must meet the rules.
 24. If driver rolls over or any part of their body touches the track, you will be flipped back over and allowed to continue running. If driver rolls over again or if any part of their body touches the track for a second time, the driver will be disqualified.
 25. In the event of a rollover, the heat will be stopped until the officials get the mower back upright.
 26. No teaming or hold and hit. ALL INVOLVED WILL BE DISQUALIFIED.
 27. Do not go past officials on the track OR YOU WILL BE DISQUALIFIED. Stay in your allowed arena space.
 28. If it comes down to 2 tractors, after 15 minutes they will shut down. 1st and 2nd will be decided upon by crowd's choice.
 29. You are only allowed through the inspection

line two times before you will be loaded, so please build responsibly.

30. Must have number painted on sides or a hood sign.

POWER WHEELS DERBY RULES:

1. Any regular electric Power Wheels vehicle is allowed. No 4-wheeler or tractor type vehicles allowed. The child's legs must be inside the compartment. The child must ride IN, not ride on, the vehicle.
2. Children ages 5 to 10 years old may participate in the modified class.
3. Helmets MUST be worn. A full face helmet is recommended.
4. Seatbelts MUST be installed, functioning, and worn at all times.
5. NO PASSENGERS ALLOWED.
6. Drill batteries, lawn mower batteries, car batteries are allowed. All batteries must be covered and placed in a safe location to prevent injury to the child, including injuries caused by battery acid.
7. Upgraded motors/gearboxes allowed. Only electric motors allowed. Motors must be no larger than 775's. No scooter motors or electric go-cart motors allowed.
8. Chassis must have originally been on a child's ride-in car or truck. No go-cart chassis or riding mower chassis allowed.
9. All doors and tailgates should be taped or strapped shut. No sharp edges. You may use zip ties, duct tape, or any other flexible product for making them stay shut.
10. Modifications to tires are allowed. This includes rubber tires, screws in tires, etc.
11. All Power Wheels must have a number so they can be recognized by the announcer in the tower. You may use paint, stickers, or a small sign to do this. Decorating is encouraged as we will have a crowd's choice award.
12. Do not add something to the Power Wheels vehicle that could cause the child to not be allowed in the derby. Remember that THIS IS FOR KIDS. You would have a disappointed child on your hands if they aren't allowed to run.
13. All Power Wheels vehicles will be checked in and then impounded until time for their event.
14. One parent MUST accompany the child to the pit area. One parent may be allowed on

the track with the child during the event.

15. Each heat will be given a time limit.
 16. If a child gets out of the Power Wheels vehicle during the event, that child is disqualified.
 17. If officials feel that a vehicle is unsafe or does not fit in the rule set, the entry will be loaded. The officials have the final say.
- PARENTS: Please don't forget that this is for fun. This is a great way to teach your child good sportsmanship. Although we will have trophies this year, we want the kids to have fun and get used to being on a track so they can keep derbies alive when they grow up. One point from back of bumper to tip of the point, may be 6" max and must be a minimum of 8" wide. Brackets can be welded to the bumper, and may be welded to the frame with maximum of 2" x 2" materials. May not go past the center of the front axle. Mount may not go back the frame any further than the axle and may not stick out any more than 5".
 9. NO SHARP EDGES.
 10. Pulley swaps are allowed, any pulley combo. Any 5 lug tractor rear is allowed. May be posi.
 11. May use stock tie rods and they may be reinforced. Aftermarket parts are allowed.
 12. Modified spindles are allowed. Crossmember must be factory, but may be welded solid.
 13. Stock ignition. A push button and toggle switch may be used.
 14. Exhaust may be straight. Maximum 15" above the hood OR factory exhaust. Header protectors are allowed.
 15. No aftermarket engines. No diesel engines. No alcohol in tractor or driver. Maximum 20 hp.
 16. Must run a metal hood and grill. No plastics. If stock hood is plastic or fiberglass, you may use sheet metal to make one. Can be seam welded, riveted or screwed together. No added reinforcements. Can run two 3/4" pieces of all tread through the front frame up through the hood. May have a 1/4" plate connected to all thread, 14" x 14" x 1/4" max. May have two 2" x 2" x 1/4" kickers that go from the front protector plate back to the main cage, one per side. MUST HAVE NUMBER VISIBLE ON THE HOOD AND/OR SIDES. NO SHARP EDGES.
 17. Engine braces and cradles are allowed.
 18. Can run aftermarket gas tank, shifter and gas pedal. Gas tank must be put in a safe spot and fastened down securely. No gas tank under the seat. Must have kill switch and gas shut off switch. This is MANDATORY. Hoses must have clamps. You can run a fuel cell, max of 2 gallons.
 19. Battery must be secured in a safe spot and visible. If not secured, you will have to take it off.
 20. Any tire and wheel combo is allowed, 6" max on the front, 12" max on the rear. Rubber tire flaps are permitted. Bead locks are permitted. Tires may have tubes - air only. Valve stem protectors are allowed. Snow blower tires are allowed. V bar tires are allowed. No tire chains. Tires must hold air only. No cement, water, foam, or any other material may be used.
 21. All tractors may have four 2" x 2" x 1/4" patch plates.

MWFA

NOTE: ALL GENERAL RULES APPLY TO ALL CLASSES

1. Any 1980 and newer two wheel drive passenger car/mini-van/mini-truck/mid-size

SUV is permitted.

2. All vehicles must be stripped of all plastic, glass, headlights, taillights, and anything else that could fall off onto the track during the show. Every vehicle must have a maximum of five (5) gallons of fuel.
3. All vehicles must remain stock. ABSOLUTELY NO WELDING ANYWHERE except as outlined in rules #9 and #10 below.
4. Bumpers must remain stock. Do not alter the bumper in any way. Factory bumper shocks must remain in factory location. You may remove rear bumpers and shocks. There is no welding to be done on bumpers.
5. Batteries may be left in stock location and spray foam may be added around battery. You may also move battery to passenger floor or seat. Battery must not move.
6. If factory gas tank is in front of the axle, you may leave it there. If it's behind the axle, you must move it to the rear seat area. Factory tanks may be moved inside, but must be completely secured. After market tanks may be used. A simple gas tank protector may be used and connected to seat bar OR floor, but not both.
7. All doors may be wired or chained in 6 places max per seam.
8. Trunks, hoods, and tailgates may be wired or chained in 6 places total. Sheet metal to sheet metal only. Nothing to the frame or the bumpers. If you remove the trunk or tailgate, you lose that wire or chain.
9. Rear seat bar or four-point cage may be added. It may be welded to post. If you have to add something to get it away from the seat, PLEASE CALL OR MESSAGE US FIRST. This is only to stop the sides from coming in, not to help in any other part of the vehicle.
10. Driver's door may only have one plate welded to the outside or inside. This is for driver safety.
11. DOT tires only. Stock wheels only. All wheel weights must be removed. Only tubes and air are permitted inside of the tires.

These rules are cut and dry. This is a quick, easy, affordable build.

All rules will be enforced. Follow them or you will not run. These are Jason Sauer's rules for MWFA which is a national class, and will not be changed unless he changes them.

STOCK POWER WHEELS DERBY RULES:

1. Any regular electric Power Wheels vehicle is allowed. No 4-wheeler or tractor type vehicles allowed. Only stock Power Wheels bumpers allowed. NO CUSTOM BUMPERS. The child's legs must be inside the compartment. The child must ride IN, not ride on, the vehicle.
2. Children ages 3 to 10 years old may participate. If enough vehicles register, there will be two heats: one for 3 to 6 year old children, and one for 7 to 10 year old children.
3. Helmets MUST be worn. A bicycle helmet is allowed. A full face helmet is recommended.
4. Seatbelts are recommended.
5. NO PASSENGERS ALLOWED.
6. You may only use a stock Power Wheels batteries or a lawn mower battery.
7. Motors must remain stock. No modifications to make the vehicle run faster than stock.
8. All doors and tailgates should be taped or strapped shut. No sharp edges. You may use zip ties, duct tape, or any other flexible product for making them stay shut.
9. Stock tires only. Tires may be covered with duct tape to prevent them from cracking or breaking. No screws in tires, no chains, etc.
10. All Power Wheels must have a number so they can be recognized by the announcer in the tower. You may use paint, stickers, or a small sign to do this. Decorative changes may be made to the Power Wheels vehicle to make it look like a derby car, but there can be no reinforcement to the Power Wheels vehicle. Changes and additions are DECORATIVE ONLY. Decorating is encouraged, as there will be a crowd's choice award.
11. Do not add something to the Power Wheels vehicle that could cause the child to not be allowed in the derby. Remember that THIS IS FOR KIDS. You would have a disappointed child on your hands if they aren't allowed to run.
12. All Power Wheels vehicles will be checked in and then impounded until time for their event.
13. One parent MUST accompany the child to the

pit area. One parent may be allowed on the track with the child during the event.

14. Each heat will be given a time limit.
15. If a child gets out of the Power Wheels vehicle during the event, that child is disqualified.
16. If the Power Wheels vehicle has more than one speed, the lowest speed must be used.
PARENTS: Please don't forget that this is for fun. This is a great way to teach your child good sportsmanship. Although we will have trophies this year, we want the kids to have fun and get used to being on a track so they can keep derbies alive when they grow up. After all, they are the future of this sport.

General Rules and Regulations

1. Exhibitors must comply with the General rules and regulations and the State of Maryland Health Regulations in the beginning of the book.
2. Exhibits in adult/open livestock classes are limited to Garrett County residents.
3. Livestock registration will be Sunday, August 2, 2026, unless otherwise noted. Animals will be released at 11 p.m., Saturday, August 8, 2026 or any time Sunday.
4. All animals arriving on the Fairgrounds must use the Main entrance off Mosser Road. Animals may be unloaded in the barn areas only. Unloading of animals between the barn area and the main exhibit barn and fair office area will not be permitted. All exhibitors will be expected to take their livestock trucks and trailers home and not park them on the fairgrounds during Fair Week. Trailers left on the Fair Grounds will need to pay \$100.00 for a trailer-parking permit.
5. No animals will be permitted, at anytime, outside the livestock barn area.
6. No tack boxes will be allowed in the swine or sheep barns. Tack boxes in the beef and dairy barns must remain in line with curbs and may not sit in aisles. Only one tack box per family is allowed. Beef trimming/blocking chutes may only be used in designated areas. All chutes must be removed from the area outside the show ring 15 minutes before each show. Tents and generators are not permitted in any area of the Fairgrounds.
7. All breeding animals exhibited must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor by June 1 (unless otherwise noted). Animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor. Animals must be registered with the appropriate Breed Association, unless otherwise noted, and will be checked by the Superintendent.
8. All livestock shall be cared for by the exhibitor or whomever they designate to do so. They will be solely responsible for the care of their animals and stalls and showing of the same.
9. The exhibitor must furnish feed.
10. All animal entries must be filed in advance with the appropriate department superintendent. Superintendents will assign stall spaces, and animals must remain in the assigned space unless approved by the Superintendent.
11. Classes are limited. Please consult each section for the number of animals accepted per exhibitor.
12. Any entry in the 4-H/FFA classes is not eligible to compete in open classes, but youth may enter other animals. Youth too young for or not in 4-H/FFA may enter in the open class.
13. The Fair Board requires all exhibitors to have their stall area, barns and general areas in a neat and orderly manner at all times. Failure to do so will result in forfeiture of premiums. All animals must be fed and washed, and all stalls and barn areas cleaned by 12 noon, except show day. Please observe the 11 p.m. to 6 p.m. curfew of not feeding or disturbing animals. All small animal pens must be cleaned out to the ground by Friday at noon. New shavings will be issued.
14. The superintendent will collect five dollars (\$5.00) per head (except horses) for beef, goats, sheep, and swine at the time of entry for cleaning of stalls at the end of the Fair. Bedding will be provided if available by the Garrett County Fair Board.
15. No selling of poultry or rabbits.
16. All complaints must be submitted in writing to the Fair Board Office.
17. If the animal is uncontrollable, unsafe or in an undesirable condition, it may be removed from the fairgrounds at the request of the Livestock Advisory Committee. The Livestock Advisory Committee will consist of Deb Barnard, Jason VanSickle, Justin Gregory, Lisa Brenneman, Mark Rodeheaver, Vernon Paugh, Sam Wright, Chaz Stoner, Extension Educators, Northern and Southern FFA Advisors and a veterinarian (when needed). Animal rejection decisions are final, and may not be appealed.

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Rules and Regulations

1. Exhibitors must comply with all General, and Department rules, and Maryland Animal Health Regulations.
2. **Dairy animals must be registered by the appropriate breed association and be eligible to be shown at a national level (87.5%). Each animal must also show appropriate breed characteristics.**
3. Dairy animals exhibited in open classes will be accepted **Sunday and Monday but must be on the grounds by noon Monday. Dairy animals exhibited in classes 12 through 19** have the option to leave **immediately after the show only**. Please consult with the section superintendent if you wish to exercise this opportunity.

Not allowed:

1. Photos will not be accepted which have been mounted with tape showing, corner album tabs, cut-outs, cut-out mattes, or use of foam board or heavy matte board.
2. No borders are allowed, nor any embellishments or lettering on the front of the photo or mount.
3. Photos with dates printed on them will not be accepted.
4. Photos by professional photographers or photography instructors will not be accepted.
5. If using glue, be advised that the humidity at the Fairgrounds may cause the photo to separate from the mount. Fair staff will not be responsible for re-gluing any entries.
6. This department is open to anyone who makes less than 25% of his/her livelihood through the sale of photography. While no specific guidelines define

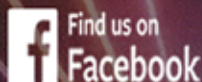

LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS Online entry will be mandatory for all 4-H/FFA livestock exhibitors.

General Rules and Regulations

1. Classes are open to currently enrolled Garrett County 4-H and FFA Club members.
2. Exhibitors must be enrolled in 4-H work on or before June 1, of current year. (Youth must be 8 years of age by January 1 and be in good standing with FFA or 4H.) To be eligible to exhibit and/or sell a species of animal at the Garrett County Agricultural Fair, the 4-H or FFA member must meet the following criteria:

The exhibitor and the animal must reside in Garrett County or within ten air miles of the Garrett County border.

If the exhibitor and/or the animal do not reside in Garrett County or within the ten air miles of the Garrett County border, the exhibitor may apply to the Garrett County Fair Board Livestock Advisory Committee for special exemption to this rule.

Exemption appeals must be submitted by October 15 for beef and by January 31 for all other species.

Members of 4-H/FFA may only exhibit livestock projects in one county 4-H/FFA program in order to be eligible to exhibit at the Garrett County Fair.

Age divisions (By Jan 1, of current year):

Junior, 8-10

Intermediate, 11-13

Senior, 14-18

(Includes youth with disabilities beyond age 18 if enrolled in a high school program.)

3. If you have a disability or a special need that requires special assistance for your participation in the Garrett County Fair, please contact the Garrett County Extension Office at 301-334-6960.
4. FFA members must be a dues paying

member of that organization.

5. Exhibitors must comply with the General rules and regulations found on page 15 and the State of Maryland Health Regulations found on page 24.
6. Exhibitors must comply with the Maryland 4-H/FFA Code of Ethics. The 4-H/FFA Code of Ethics applies to all individuals exhibiting Beef Cattle, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goats, Meat Goats, Horses, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, and Swine and other livestock projects at the Garrett County Fair. Exhibitors of Market Animals must also comply with the Garrett County Livestock Association's Rules and Regulations with regard to selling their animal.
7. Exhibitors who do not obey rules and/or behavior expectation standards of the Maryland 4-H and FFA programs will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action as established in the Code of conduct in effect for each organization.
8. Each 4-H and FFA member must have completed the Livestock Quality Assurance Training to exhibit and sell an animal. Must also meet attendance requirements as listed in Garrett County Livestock Association Contract.
9. Market animal entries will be received Sunday, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. All market animals must be on the grounds by 4 p.m. Sunday. Health Certificates with completed self certification and registration papers will be checked during these hours. Animal health and condition will be checked by veterinarian Sunday after 4 p.m. No blankets, tubes or coverings may be placed on animals until this walk thru is completed. Breeding animals (except dairy) will also be entered on Sunday.
10. Animals will be released at 11 p.m., Saturday, August 9, 2026.
11. All animals arriving on the Fairgrounds must use the entrance off Mosser Road. Animals may be unloaded in the barn areas only. Unloading of animals between the barn area and the main exhibit barn and fair office area will not be permitted. All exhibitors will be expected to take their livestock trucks and trailers home and not park them on the fairgrounds during Fair Week. Trailers left on the Fairgrounds will need to pay \$100.00 for a trailer-parking permit.
12. No animals will be permitted, at anytime.

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- outside the livestock barn area.
13. NO tack boxes will be allowed in the swine or sheep barns. Tack boxes in the beef and dairy barns must remain in line with curbs and may not sit in aisles. Only one tack box per family is allowed. Beef trimming/blocking chutes may only be used in designated areas. All chutes must be removed from the area outside the show ring 15 minutes before each show. Tents, canopies and/or generators are not allowed anywhere on the Fairgrounds.
 14. All registered animals exhibited must be bona fide property of the exhibitor. Animals must be registered with the appropriate Breed Association, in the name of the exhibitor. Registration papers will be checked by the Superintendent. All market animals (with the exception of Market Steers) and commercial beef breeding heifers must be tagged at the spring weigh in. Market Steers must be tagged at the previous fall weigh in.
 15. All livestock shall be cared for by the exhibitor or whomever they designate to do so. They will be solely responsible for the care of their animals and stalls and showing of the same. In the case of illness or emergency, the exhibitor or parent must report to the appropriate show superintendent. If a substitute showman is approved, he or she must be a 4-H or FFA member of the same chronological age or younger than the exhibitor he/she is replacing or may be a member of the ill or injured child's immediate family. Parents and spectators are not permitted in the show ring during a show. Interference with the show or judging may result in disqualification or removal. There will be adults assigned to the show ring to assist youth.
 16. The exhibitor must furnish feed.
 17. Any medical issues of exhibited animals will be the responsibility of the exhibitor and families should call their regular veterinarian to arrange for advice or care.
 18. All animal entries must be filed in advance with the appropriate department superintendent. Superintendents will assign stall spaces, and animals must remain in the assigned space unless approved by the Superintendent. (All 4-H and FFA market animals need not register for a stall space. Information will be provided to the Superintendent by the 4-H program.)
 19. All 4-H and FFA market animals must have been ear tagged as project animals according to the Garrett Livestock Association guidelines.
 20. Market animals will be weighed in on Sunday, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. No Market Animal may be re-weighed. Sheep, goats, and swine will be weighed as removed from trucks. Steers will be weighted on scales located at entrance to Steer Barn.
 21. Market animals (beef, sheep, hog, goat) which are over or under the listed weight range **MAY** be allowed to stay on the fairgrounds, if space is available. Over or underweight animals may be shown in the Showmanship for that species. Over and underweight animals will be judged in separate market classes and will not be eligible for championships, county bred championships or the livestock sale. Under and overweight animals will not be eligible for rate of gain award.
 22. Members are permitted to exhibit two (2) entries per class; except, one animal in market classes, rabbits, and poultry and elsewhere as noted by showing animals in conformation competition in appropriate class(s). By entering, exhibitors agree to showing animals in competition in appropriate classes.
 23. Any animal in beef, sheep, swine, dairy goat, meat goat and dairy, shown but not receiving any premium will be awarded a \$5.00 premium.
 24. Any entry in the 4-H/FFA classes is not eligible to compete in open classes, but youth may enter other animals.
 25. The Fair Board requires all exhibitors to have their stall area, barns and general areas in a neat and orderly manner at all times. Failure to do so will result in forfeiture of premiums. All animals must be fed and washed, and all stalls and barn areas cleaned by 12 noon, except show day. Please observe the 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. curfew of not feeding or disturbing animals. All small animal pens must be cleaned out to the ground by Friday at noon. New shavings will be issued.
 26. The superintendent will collect five dollars (\$5.00) per head for sheep, goats, beef,

and swine at the time of entry for cleaning of stalls at the end of the Fair.

27. If an animal is uncontrollable, unsafe or in an undesirable condition, it may be removed from the fairgrounds at the request of the Livestock Advisory Committee. The Livestock Advisory Committee will consist of Deb Barnard, Jason Vansickle, Justin Gregory, Lisa Brennehan, Mark Rodeheaver, Vernon Paugh, Sam Wright, Chaz Stoner, Extension Educators, Northern and Southern FFA Advisors and a veterinarian (when needed). Animal rejection decisions are final, and may not be appealed.
28. All complaints must be submitted in writing to the Fair Board Office.
29. The Garrett County Livestock Association will not be responsible for non-market animals left at the fairgrounds after Saturday, August 8, 2026. Any animal still remaining on the fairgrounds Monday morning at 9 a.m., following the Fair will become property of the Garrett County Fair and will be taken to the stockyard.
30. A member may show a leased animal as long they do not raise the same species where they live. Leasing is intended to provide an opportunity to a youth that would otherwise not be able to participate in that project. Lease papers must be on file at the Extension Office by June 1st, of current year.
31. Sale order will be Grand Champion, Reserve Grand Champion, Champion, and Reserve Champion Division winners, County-bred Grand and Reserve Grand Champion and County-bred Division Champions. Remaining exhibitors will draw for sale order.

Maryland 4-H/FFA Code of Animal Science Ethics

4-H members enrolled in animal science projects (e.g., beef, camelids, cat, cavy, dairy, dog, goat, horse, poultry, rabbit, sheep, small pet, and swine) shall, at all times, conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship, including while with their projects and at all 4-H animal science activities and events. Their conduct should always reflect the highest standards

of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of 4-H and its animal science program. 4-H members, as well as parents, UME volunteers and others working with them, are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts; and their conduct and values must serve as a positive influence on others.

This Code of Ethics applies to all 4-H members who are enrolled in animal science projects, and to others (4-Hers, parents, volunteers, owners, etc.) who participate in the animal science program; and it covers daily animal care, as well as participation in 4-H competitions and other 4-H animal activities and events, and other animal activities and events where the youth participates as a 4-H member.

4-H members and others who violate this Code of Ethics demean the integrity of 4-H and its animal science program. 4-H members who violate the code of animal science ethics are subject to sanctions including, but not limited to, forfeiture of premiums, awards, and/or auction proceeds and may be prohibited from participation in 4-H or 4-H/UME events or activities; other violators may also be subject to sanction, as appropriate. Infractions may be reviewed by 4-H and/or UME (on the local or state level, as appropriate to the infraction and to the event and/or activity in question), and/or may be subject to a fair oversight committee or other entity that oversees an activity or event. In addition, some acts may also be subject to review based upon the Maryland 4-H Youth Code of Conduct and/or other UME policies.

The following is a list of standards and requirements for all 4-H animal science projects, at all times, whether at home, at animal exhibitions or events, or any other 4-H event or activity.

1. The care of all 4-H project animals is the responsibility of the 4-H member. 4-H members must properly care for and groom their animals for the duration of their project. 4-H members are encouraged to establish/maintain a veterinarian-client-patient relationship.
2. All project animals must be housed at the 4-H member's residence unless a different

- location is submitted to and approved in writing by the local 4-H staff. Any change in location must be approved in writing by the local 4-H staff; however, it is not necessary to report direct transport to and from shows or other events.
3. Upon request of 4-H, UME, or other program, fair, event or animal officials, 4-H members must present proof of ownership, length of ownership, identity and/or age of all 4-H project animals owned or leased. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or identity of animals, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited. If a 4-H project animal is sold in a livestock sale, it is no longer eligible to be shown in a 4-H event in Maryland in that year.
 4. 4-H members must provide appropriate animal health certificates (Certificate of Veterinary Inspection) upon request of 4-H, UME, or other program, fair, event or animal officials. All exhibitors/parents or guardians must inspect their animal(s) for signs of contagious or infectious disease before coming to a show in the state of Maryland. The Maryland Department of Agriculture "Self-Certification of Animal Health" must be completed prior to loading animals for exhibition.
 5. 4-H project animals must be presented to competition, activities and/or events, where they will enter the food chain, free of volatile drug residues.
 6. Animals which are presented to competition, events and/or activities that do not culminate with the animal entering the food chain, shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations and rules.
 7. 4-H project animals shall not be exhibited if drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and local regulations and rules may affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.
 8. At any time after an animal arrives on a fair or other 4-H activity or event premises, a licensed veterinarian must administer or, in consultation with fair, event, UME, or 4-H officials, direct the administration of any treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications. Drenching at any time after an animal arrives on a fair or other 4-H activity or event premises is prohibited, except when performed or directed by a licensed veterinarian in consultation with fair, event, UME, or 4-H officials for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal.
 9. The act of enrolling in a 4-H animal science project, and/or entering a project animal in a 4-H competition, show, activity, or other event, gives consent for 4-H or UME or event authorities to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, hair, tissue, or other substance from the animal to be used for testing purposes including, but not limited to, drugs or identification. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood or other substance tested by the approved laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved, and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the 4-H owner to prove otherwise at any review in regard to the matter conducted by a fair or other event or the 4-H program. If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, hair, tissue or other sample, taken from a 4-H animal science project, indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally.
 10. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counter irritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
 11. Using ice, ice packs, cold packs, or cold compresses, internally or externally, other than those prescribed to relieve heat stress or a medical condition as diagnosed by



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- a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
12. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices, such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical devices, or other similar practices, are not acceptable and are prohibited.
 13. All judges, fair and event officials and/or UME/4-H staff and volunteers shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect, and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them or toward exhibitors or others participating in the activity. In addition, direct criticism or interference with a judge, fair, show or event official, exhibitor, breed representative, or UME/4-H staff or volunteer before, during, or after an event or other activity is prohibited.
 14. No one shall violate this Code of Animal Science Ethics or conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this Code of Ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this Code of Ethics.
 15. The application of this Code of Ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition to the 4-H member whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this Code of Ethics.
 16. By enrolling in an animal science project and/or entering an animal in a fair or other 4-H event or activity, the 4-H member, and his/her parent or guardian, consent to have disciplinary action taken by appropriate authorities (including UME, 4-H, fair, event and/or other activity officials) for violation of this Code of Animal Science Ethics and/or any other applicable rules of UME, 4-H, a fair, activity or other event, without recourse against UME, 4-H and/or other authorities. In addition, the 4-H member, and his/her parent or guardian, further understand and agree that any action which contravenes these rules, and is also in violation of federal, state, or local laws, statutes, regulations, or rules, may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

 Note: By signing this form, the 4-H member and his/her parent or guardian each verify that they have read and understand the UME 4-H Code of Animal Science Ethics and the consequences of and penalties provided for violations of the Code

Showmanship

1. All showmanship classes are for ribbons only. Exhibitors must own animals they are showing.
2. The fitting and preparation of all animals for show is the responsibility of the exhibitors. Exhibitors may receive guidance from immediate family members, other Maryland 4-H/FFA youth and county adult leaders. Violations of this policy could result in immediate disqualification of the exhibitor from all 4-H and FFA livestock shows and competitions at the Garrett County Fair and Maryland State Fair and dismissal from the grounds. The Livestock Advisory Committee will handle violations of this policy.
3. Daily hair/skin care products (shampoo and conditioners) will be permitted. No aerosol products, adhesives, color alteration products, paints or hair building products will be allowed.

4-H and FFA Animal Show Attire

4-H and FFA members must wear the prescribed attire when participating in showmanship, breeding, and market classes, pictures and sales.

FFA members exhibiting will need to follow FFA official dress requirements for showing livestock (white collared shirt, neck tie/scarf, black pants and jacket). Students who have been chapter officers have the option of wearing official officer polos and khakis.

Livestock (Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goat, Rabbit, Dog)

1. Proper show attire is required for all showmanship, breeding, markets shows, pictures and the livestock sale.
2. Black, khaki, or dark-color slacks/jeans are required. Girls may substitute dark-color or khaki-colored skirts.
3. White or dressy shirts with sleeves and a collar are required.
4. No hats may be worn in the show/sale ring.
5. Appropriate neckpieces may be worn.
6. Unacceptable attire includes T-shirts,

shirts with inappropriate logos (such as advertising for alcohol, tobacco or farm names), faded or dirty jeans, and jeans with holes.

7. Safe, appropriate attire, including footwear, is required at all times. No sandals or lightweight tennis shoes. Good work shoes or boots are best.
8. Proper show items for your animal are required. Example: Swine - hog cane or flapper and a brush; Beef - show stick, comb and show halter. For beef, no nose rings will be allowed.

Dairy and Dairy Goats

1. White or khaki slacks, girls may wear knee length skirt, with white shirt; optional neckpiece
2. No prong or pinch collars will be allowed when showing any 4H goat.

Horse and Pony

1. Appropriate riding clothes and head gear for the division.

Dairy Goats, Market Goats and any Breeding Goats

1. No prong or pinch collars will be allowed when showing any 4H goat.

All exhibitors are expected to be neat and presentable at all times.

When a division champion in the market show is also a county bred animal that entry will automatically be the county bred division champion and will represent that entire division in the Grand Champion County Bred Champion competition. If the division champion is not a county bred animal, but the division reserve champion is a county bred animal, the entry will automatically be the county bred champion in that weight division. The county bred division reserve champion will then be selected from among the highest placing animal from each class within the division. The County Bred Division Champion will be selected from among the three County Bred Division Champions. 3. Superintendents may disqualify or not accept entries of any undesirable animals.

4. The Maryland 4-H Tail Docking Policy

4-H lambs should be docked no shorter than the distal end of the caudal tail fold. The caudal fold is a flap of skin attached to the underside of the tail near the rectum and is clearly visible when the tail is lifted. Lambs docked in this manner will have a minimum tail length of 0.7 inches at the time of show. Purchased lambs (market and breeding) should have a minimum tail length of 1.4 inches at the time of "weaning." This gives a high probability that the lamb's tail will measure at least 0.7 inches at the time of show. 4-Hers should use the DeTail device to select lambs that have been properly docked. Compliance with the Maryland 4-H Tail docking Policy will be VOLUNTARY. Lamb tails (docks) will not be officially measured at Maryland 4-H activities. No lambs will be disqualified from showing due to tail length, unless the short dock results in a rectal prolapse. Any sheep or lamb that exhibits a rectal prolapse at a 4-H activity will be ineligible for the activity and sent home by the Sheep Superintendent, Extension Educator or other appropriately deemed individual. The following will be used as a guideline to determine occurrence of a rectal prolapse:

Required compliance: "Any sheep or lamb that exhibits a rectal prolapse at a 4-H activity will be ineligible for that show and be sent home by Extension Educator, Sheep Superintendent, or other appropriately deemed individual. Lambs with purse-string sutures are ineligible for exhibition at 4-H Show." The following will be used as guideline for making this determination: "A rectal prolapse is defined as an inversion of the rectum that protrudes 4 cm (1.6 in.) or

more outside the body and remains exterior to the body while the animal is standing." (*Journal of Animal Science* 2003, Thomas et al.) If a lamb is observed with rectal prolapse (by one of the above people) and in the future is not observed with a rectal prolapse, it is still classified as having a rectal prolapse.

5. All sheep must be properly presented for show. All MARKET sheep must be Slick Shorn.
6. All Sheep must be entered on Sunday.
7. All sheep must have a USDA Scrapie tag.,

Section 12 Wool Fleece

Rules and Regulations

- Purpose - to encourage the production of better wool, to provide an opportunity for producers to learn about the qualities of better wool and to provide an opportunity for the public to learn more about the "miracle fiber," wool.

6. The MSC coordinator will supply each species of animal for the MSC entrants. These animals will be volunteered by other

4-H and FFA members. All volunteered animals must be entered in the appropriate classes during the week of the Fair. The volunteer is responsible for getting their animal(s) to and from the show ring. Animals are expected to be clean. A contestant may not exhibit their own animal during the MSC.

- All booths must be in place by 4 pm on Saturday.
- Call or write 4-H office to reserve space, state if electricity is needed.
- Uniform name plates, showing club name, will be made by the 4-H office. Do not include club name in booth exhibit.
- Booths set-up and constructed by members only.
- FFA chapter booths and individual 4-H booths will be judged separately.
- All booths should relate to 4-H/FFA work. This should be indicated in some way in the booth. The booth could be promotional, education, community improvement, citizenship, projects, or activities.

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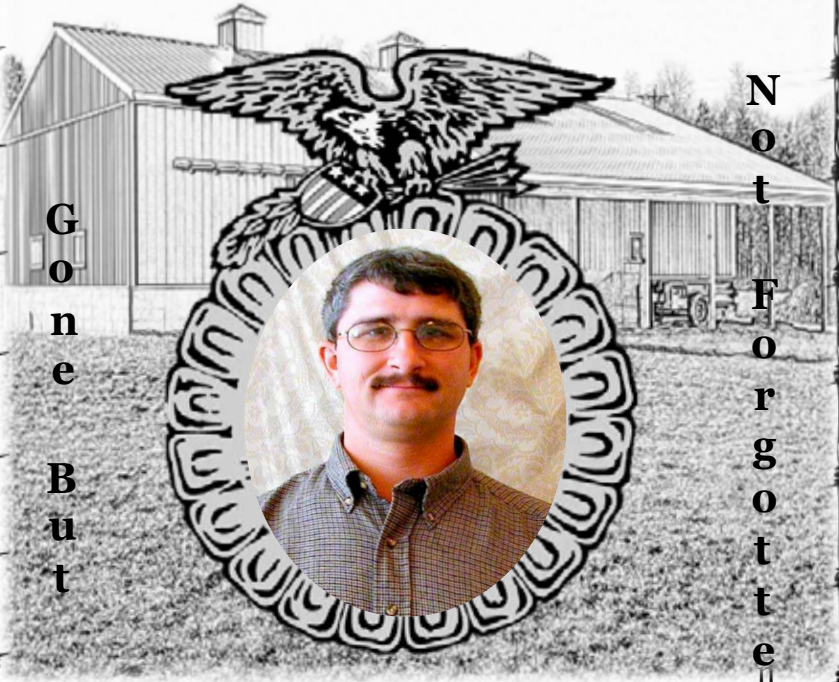

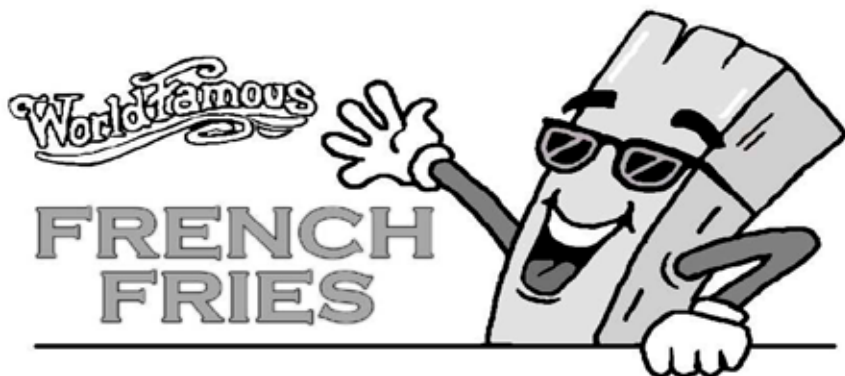

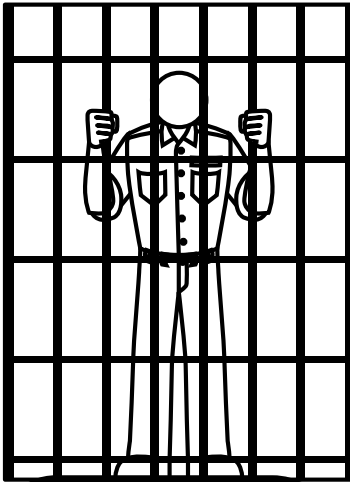
